More than a Motto: Loving Christ. Loving One Another. Loving the City.

PART 1: LOVING Christ

e believe that God has designed and designated this community of believers together to *Love* nother and Love

Jesus Christ, Love One Another, and Love the City. That is our motto. But, it is more than a motto. It is our mission. Although these words are printed on our handouts and literature, on our website or coffee cups, they are empty if they are not burned on our hearts.

We believe that the God of the universe is bending us toward a new, restored relationship with Him, with one another and with the world and people around us.

The Apostle Paul wrote,

God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. -Philippians 2:9-11

The "name" of Christ is mentioned three times in these three verses. Why is the name of Jesus Christ so important?

The name of Jesus is important because, in the days of the Bible, there was no shortage of "other gods" in the neighborhood of Israel. Paul highlights the "name" of Christ because the name of Jesus is about specificity. It specifies which "God" we worship and serve. It's about acknowledging this specific God, this specific reality, this supernatural person, and renouncing all the others. Period.

To exalt the name of Jesus Christ, is to acknowledge that there is no other truth apart from His truth. There is no other way apart from His way, and there is no other life apart from His life and the life that He gives. He has total authority and victory, and one day even those who denied, opposed or ignored him will bow down before Him.

I was recently reminded of the importance of the name of Christ on August 28, my anniversary. On August 28, 1993, I made my marriage vows to my extraordinary wife. I did not make my marriage vows to all women, or to any woman. I made them to Morgan.

When we make our marriage vows, we do not make our vows generically to *a spouse, a husband* or *a wife: any husband* or *any wife.* We make our vows to a specific person. I take you Morgan, to be my wife, forsaking all others.

Our Motto begins with Christ because, the people of Christ's church are not married to a generic higher power. Revelations tells us that we are the Bride of Christ! To exalt the name of Jesus Christ is to say that He is not simply one name among many names, one path among many paths, one method among many methods. He alone is Lord.

To be Christian is to have all of your eggs in one basket. It is to say (and mean) that, "I not only believe in Jesus Christ," but also that "I am totally dependent on Him and I'm betting my entire life on Him, forsaking all other possibilities and strategies." Not Jesus and something else, but Christ alone.

That is why the mission of our church begins with Loving Jesus Christ.

He loves us so much that He gave His life to prove it. No matter what chains, baggage, fears, guilt or unfulfilled expectations we carry, He bet His own life on God to prove that God is infinitely greater, higher, better and stronger than everything that traps us, threatens us, beguiles us, tempts us, scares us, or confuses us.

To quote one of our favorite songs of praise, by Keith and Kristyn Getty,

"In Christ alone, my hope is found; He is my light, my strength, my song."

Our devotion to Jesus Christ must inspire and challenge every decision we make. Loving Christ should pull us back to the person who is not only real, but is non-negotiable. Our top priority and the first point of our motto is to tell people the truth and to show people the love and compassion of Jesus Christ. We want everyone to know who He is and what He has done for us.

FREEDOM SUNDAY TO ADDRESS GLOBAL SLAVERY, HUMAN TRAFFICKING

very July our First Presbyterian tradition is to gather on the Sunday nearest the July 4 holiday to celebrate the freedoms we enjoy. That celebration is all the more poignant because throughout history, members of our church have risked their lives—and many have laid down their lives—in defense of freedom.

As Christians, we are rooted in Biblical themes of slavery and redemption, thankful that Jesus has rescued us from our own darkness, freeing us to the fullness of life in Him.

What does it mean to be unfree? As Americans in the 21st century, do we really understand what slavery feels like? For much of the world today, and for dark corners in our own country, slavery is not a hypothetical issue. Today, there are over 40 million enslaved people around the world. That is more than at any time in history. Human trafficking is a \$150 billion global business. One in four victims of slavery is a child.

What is the human face of

slavery? It could be a 15-yearold girl in Southeast Asia who is forced into prostitution, or entire families in India forced to work long hours in garment factories or brick kilns. It could be abused and hungry children forced to work on fishing boats in Africa.

First Presbyterian Church is in the fight to end global slavery through our partnership with International Justice Mission. IJM is the largest international anti-slavery organization, working in 19 program offices in 11 countries across the developing world to combat slavery, trafficking, and other forms of violence against the poor. IJM works to rescue and restore victims, hold perpetrators accountable, and help transform broken public justice systems.

On Sunday, September 22, we will celebrate Freedom Sunday and will have a special opportunity to hear about IJM's work from Pablo Villeda, Regional President for IJM in Latin America. Pablo will be speaking in all worship services, and we will have a special luncheon with him following the 11:00 a.m. services. Please pray for this upcoming event and please join us for the lunch! LOVING OUR CITY

A Testimony from the San Antonio East Side Local Mission Trip

During the week of July 25 - 29, our church participated in a local mission trip. This trip took place on the east side of San Antonio in conjunction with one of our local mission partners, Servant Partners, and a couple of other local churches: First Baptist and La Luz en el Barrio. Our mission was to go door-to-door with groups of three-to-four people sharing our personal testimonies, the gospel, and offering prayer to people in the neighborhood and then to end the week with a block party with free food and games to further reach people with the gospel. The east side is an economically depressed area and according to Servant Partners' website, 50% of the community is only Spanish-speaking. I'm not great at math, but that means I have a 100% chance of not being able to communicate with 50% of the people in the neighborhood to begin with. Many people in the community do not attend church despite the neighborhood being full of churches. They have lost any hope that God cares for them in the midst of poverty and crime all around them.

he only type of evangelism—if you can call it that—I've ever done has been passing out water bottles with Bible

verses on them when I was about 14 years old at the church I grew up going to during an annual festival in my hometown. Needless to say, this doorto-door evangelism was completely out of my comfort zone. Thankfully, Servant Partners conducted a training for people, like myself, who had never evangelized in this way. They had us write and practice a 15-second testimony with questions at the end to prompt further conversation and they showed us a dummy-proof way to share the gospel called "three circles." We practiced at our tables at the training house before we went out to our respective locations with our groups. To be honest, I was skeptical about how this type of evangelism would work. Would it be effective? I figured we would have a lot of slammed doors in our faces or we would not be able to communicate with Spanish-speaking families. This

was the devil telling me lies because let me tell you—God showed up!

I was in a group with Mitchell Moore, Jacob Gray, and Katie Shute. We all rode to our first location together eager to share what we had practiced at the house and what we believed in our hearts. To say I wasn't nervous would be a lie, but I knocked on the first house's door. We introduced ourselves, shared what we were doing there, and we prayed for a sweet lady getting ready to attend a wake. We also invited her to the block party. I took that as a win! I was just glad someone came to the door and actually talked to us. But when I think God is big, He shows me just how big He really is.

The next door we knocked on, a young lady walked out and hesitantly opened the door about halfway. She did not open the locked screen door, and was talking to us through that. Mitchell introduced all of us and told her we were from First Presbyterian, a nearby church. He asked if she had anything she wanted us to be praying for her for, and she quickly said, "No,"





as she then began to back away from the door and close it. Mitchell asked her what her name was, and she told us. He asked how long she'd lived in this house, and she said, "About a month. I moved here from another part of town." So, I asked, "Where did you move from?" She said, "Converse." I said, "No way! I work in Converse. I teach at Woodlake Hills Middle School!" It was at that moment that she opened the screen door and her face lit up because she graduated from Judson High School in 2009. We chatted a few minutes about that and how her sister went to Woodlake Hills Middle School where I teach. She told us more about her life and how she had two sons, Kimari and Kevonte. They were two and four. Katie chimed in and told her how she helps teach the four-year-old Sunday school class at church and would be excited to see her oldest there if they decided to visit our church.

Mitchell then asked her if she loved Jesus and had Him in her heart. She said she grew up going to church with her grandma, feels like she's mostly a good person, but that she messes up sometimes. And that she doesn't really go to church anymore. Mitchell shared his 15-second testimony with her. After that, he said, "And my friend Laurel really wants to share with you about the gospel and what that means." I was a little taken aback since this was my first time ever sharing the gospel with a complete stranger, but something came over me. I know it was the Holy Spirit because I am the furthest thing from eloquent or well-spoken, but I shared the gospel. I told her that we live in a broken world full of problems and try to escape it by substance abuse, good deeds, perfectionism, relationships, and more, but we always end up back in the broken world. I told her that this world was not designed by God to be that way. It was originally designed out of love to be in perfect relationship with God, our Creator, and to have perfect relationships with others, but our sin brought us to this broken world because we turned against God with our human nature. I shared with her that Jesus came to this earth to live a perfect life that none of us could ever live. He died on the cross to save us from our sins and rose from the grave. If we repent and believe this, we can be new creations in relationship with Christ and share that love with others in the world. Mitchell asked if she wanted to accept Jesus into her heart, and she did. She repeated the prayer of salvation

after Mitchell, and Jacob prayed a beautiful prayer of thanksgiving over her. He described the scene of a thousand angels rejoicing in heaven for this young woman who had just received Christ. It was a beautiful moment. We passed out some gospel bracelets for her boys, and we gave her a few resources and a Bible for her to use and learn from.

The CRAZIEST part about this story of the young woman accepting Jesus as her Lord and Savior is that the entire time we were sharing with her and praying, there was an endless flow of traffic in and out of that drug house where she lived. With her two sons. We walked away from that home just completely broken-hearted for the dealings that went on there and the environment her sons were growing up in. We hurt for the brokenness all around and the dark places in which those people's hearts dwelt. As we walked away, I simultaneously felt so blessed by how God used all of us and our gifts to share with her. And that God allowed her to be receptive to our words. Mitchell sharing his testimony, me having a connection with her to school and sharing the gospel, Katie sharing her connection with children's ministry at the church, and Jacob praying over her. Walking to the next house, Mitchell said, "It's like Psalm 110: "Rule in the midst of your enemies!"

The rest of the night, every door we knocked on got an answer, they all spoke English, and Jacob prayed the prayer of salvation with an 84-year-old man dying of cancer. If you're hesitant to do this type of mission work, you can do it! God can, and will, use you.


