Pastor's Pondering

Skin in the Game

One of the best books I have read in recent months is a book entitled *Love Does* written by Bob Goff. It is a New York Times Best Seller and it is one of those books that, at least for me, I just never wanted to end. I highly recommend you read the book if you haven't already, and be challenged to "do" love.

One of the stories Bob shared in the book was "Skin in the Game." In particular he talked about a character in the Bible named Joshua and how over and over again God told Joshua to be strong and courageous. Goff writes, "The way I read it, it sounds an awful lot like God is calling us out and telling us to pick a fight." Now, before you think this is about "fighting" let me share with you the rest of the story. Goff continues:

As Joshua was about to enter the land God promised him, he met an angel with his sword drawn in front of him. Joshua must have had some lawyer in him because he asked the angelic warrior something I would ask: "Whose side are you on?" No doubt, Joshua was hoping the angelic warrior was for them. That's what I'd hope for. I love the warrior's answer to Joshua's question. It was simple: "Neither. Take of your shoes." The angel wasn't interested in picking sides; he wanted them to pick God. The angel told them to take off their shoes because they were on holy ground, just as we are today.

Imagine if we all walked around barefooted! Imagine if we sincerely viewed the ground we walked on was holy—that everywhere we were was God's dance floor. I am convinced this is what the Lord desires from each of us as followers of Jesus Christ. Of course, you are not literally going to walk around shoeless—but the reality is, some do. The point is, we must "pick God" in response to Him choosing us.

Make a Tangible Difference

One way we can "take our shoes off" is in our giving. I love how Goff put it: "God wants us to get some skin in the game and to help make a tangible difference." On October 27 you will be given an opportunity to make a tangible difference. October 27 will be "Commitment Sunday" here at your FPC, and you will be given the privilege to get some "skin in the game" by making a financial commitment to the life and ministry of FPC. We will gather in the Sanctuary for two blended services at 9:00 a.m. and 11:15 a.m., much as we did on Kickoff Sunday September 8, when we inaugurated the sermon series "This Is My FPC." You will be able to bring your pledge card and turn it in during worship as an act of discipleship and service. I am convinced this should be the natural response to God's grace in Jesus Christ. However, I also believe this should be a privilege that we take seriously as we consider how "This is my FPC."

I pray that, together, we will run barefoot toward the Lord on October 27. My hope is that we will be strong and courageous and pick God rather than a fight or sides. My heart's desire is for each of us to get some "skin in the game" as an act of rededication of our love and devotion to Jesus Christ. Ultimately, this is His FPC and yet we have been given an incredible opportunity to take an ownership stake in what He is doing here. That's what love does—it moves us to respond.

In advance, thank you for your faithfulness and generosity. Together may we strive for Kingdom giving as we continue living to make Jesus visible. Keep smilin' and keep lovin'.

Why Mission Road Says "This Is My FPC"

First Presbyterian Church is a vital part of the Mission Road Family, made up of children and adults with special needs, their families, their dedicated staff, the MRM governing boards, and its donors. FPC is Mission Road's FPC because its congregants make Jesus visible to every member

of the MRM family through their gifts of time, talents and treasure. Directly or indirectly the church provides a Christ-like atmosphere of love, care and forgiveness that says to our clients that they are worthy of love; excellent care; beautiful, safe surroundings; delicious, nutritious food; nice clothes and fun with friends. FPC ensures that the Mission Road clients are respected, included in the life of the community and helped to reach their God -given potential.

How Mission Road staff member Eddie made Jesus visible to Jeremiah

Jeremiah is a 15-year-old African-American child who came to live at Mission Road. Profoundly intellectually and developmentally disabled (IDD), he had never been taught basic life skills by his alcoholic, sadistic mother. In place of love, he was beaten and burned. In place of care, he was left in bed to wallow in his excrement. He was not regularly fed, and at age 13, weighed just 56 pounds. He arrived in a wheelchair – unable to walk or speak. Unkempt and slumped over, he could not hold himself upright in his wheelchair. He had few clothes, matted and unruly hair, and did not want anyone to touch him. As one might expect, he trusted no one.

Once in our care here at Mission Road, Jeremiah's life slowly began to turn around. His remarkable caregiver, Eddie, a strong, gentle African American man, made Jeremiah his priority. When Jeremiah could not sit still for a barber, Eddie took time after work hours to painstakingly cut his hair. He carefully dressed him in new clothes. He even bought some things for him with his own money. Eddie was making Jesus visible. He loved and respected Jeremiah and gave of himself to him.

At school, Jeremiah was taught to use a stander—a device that supports him in a standing position. He saw himself for the first time in a mirror—standing. He was fascinated. Who was that tall, handsome, clean-cut young man? New hope began to come alive in Jeremiah. His caregivers were making Jesus visible, opening his eyes to who he is in Christ.

Now Jeremiah is making great strides. His atrophied muscles are gaining strength and he is learning new skills. Jeremiah is healing; body, mind and spirit. He is learning to take responsibility for his actions and make good choices about his behavior. Jeremiah is gaining independence and self-respect. He is seeing Jesus in the Mission Road family a part of which is First Presbyterian Church.

At Mission Road, Jeremiah has been given hope, a new family and friends. He is loved. One of his most touching changes is that he now lets others caress him and put their faces next to

his. Before, he would throw up his hands to protect himself, but now he trusts. Jeremiah responds to the visible Jesus with trust and love. Jesus has come into his heart. Jeremiah is now beginning to make Jesus visible to others.

Reflections on Stewardship and Church: A Match Made in Heaven!

In our daily lives and various encounters with other people, we may often and proudly claim First Presbyterian as "my church, my FPC!" But, what exactly do we mean by that statement and what is its significance for how we view stewardship? Here are a few thoughts on how to make that proclamation a truly joyous reality!

A deeper understanding of stewardship and church must always begin as the Bible does: "In the beginning God created Then God said, 'Let us make man in our image, in our likeness, and let them rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth, and over all the creatures that move along the ground.' God saw all that he had made, and it was very good. ... The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it." (Genesis 1:1, 26, 31a; 2:15) Simply put, God's creative pattern for humanity, for us, is focused on his boundless blessings and our attendant responsibility to be good stewards so we might glorify God and enjoy him forever.

Scripture also reminds us how that pattern got messed up by our human propensity to serve self first. We are familiar with scriptural accounts of how many "did not do what was right in the eyes of the LORD" and, by failing to be good stewards, ended up alienated from God and even from self and others. But we are even more familiar with and ever thankful for the sheer grace of God in Jesus Christ and how he overcame that alienation by offering his life on our behalf. This is where a full understanding of "church" becomes so important to faithful stewardship. Little children get it right when they sing, "Here is the church, and here is the steeple; open the doors and see all the people." The simple scriptural truth is that church is always about people and their needs; property is secondary. Moreover, Jesus chose his followers; they did not choose him. And through his death, all who are led by the Spirit to proclaim "Jesus is Lord" realize that they are not their own but have been "bought at a price." (1 Corinthians 6:19) Faith then leads us to accept that the church is God's church; it exists and is set apart to serve his purpose.

How well we understand and respond to that purpose is what our stewardship is all about. These timeless words of God through the prophet Malachi bear witness to God's steadfast love of his church and how we might respond: "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this" says the LORD Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it." (Malachi 3:10) As humans, we like to say that we "own" things, such as a home or other property. But, we never say that we "own" our spouses or children. Rather, when we lovingly say "My wife or my husband or my son or my daughter," we are proclaiming both the sacredness of those relationships and our willingness to put their concerns and welfare above self, to love them unconditionally and to take care of them to the best of our abilities. That is relational stewardship at its finest!

May that same stewardship mindset and level of spiritual insight undergird our proclamations of "my church, my FPC!" Because God in Jesus Christ has laid claim to our lives, individually and as a congregation, we are to approach our stewardship of his church with a deep and sincere trust in the promises of God. And, we are to do so in the manner offered by the apostle Paul to the early church: "As God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity. Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." (Colossians 3:12-17)

May it always be so in our life together—in worship, fellow-ship, prayer, service and, yes, even stewardship!

Worship in Music

"The Best of Bess" Concert Honors a First Presbyterian Church and San Antonio Music Legend

Mark your calendar for a very special Fall Choral Concert at First Presbyterian Church, Sunday, October 27, at 3:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary.



Our Sanctuary Choir will join with the UTSA Concert Choir to present "The Best of Bess!" It's an afternoon of choral and organ music recognizing the outstanding talent of the late Dr. Bess Hieronymous who was Organist/Choir Director at First Presbyterian Church for 28 years and UTSA's emeritus professor of organ performance.

Organ concert works will be performed by Dr. Jae Ha and by Dr. David Eaton, The Bess Hieronymous Fellow of Organ and Harpsichord at UTSA. The UTSA choir will be directed by Dr. John Silantien and our own Sanctuary Choir will be conducted by our Minister of Music, Tom Dooling. Works include several "favorite anthems" from our music library, chosen by those of us who sang them under Bess' direction.

Bess Hieronymus was once credited with having said, "If you believe in a God, you should offer the best to the worship of that God. Classical music lifts us all up and inspires us. That's what art is supposed to do." She not only firmly believed and practiced this principle; she also urged her students and her choirs to share in this belief.

While many FPC Members may recall Bess' tenure and got to know her during her years at the church, most people are not aware of her many accomplishments and her "draw" to quality church music and musicianship. As our choir members have gotten to know more about Bess and her long service at FPC, we'd like to take you on a "trip" through her music history ... please read on!

A Bit of Bess' Background

Bess' family first became aware of her musical ability when she was three years old and rewarded her with a ukulele, her first instrument. She was first hired as a church organist in her hometown of Temple, Texas when she was just 13 years old, and for a while she commuted to Waco to study the organ.

Despite this early experience, she was principally a pianist in

the first 30 years of her life. She studied with Walter Gilbewicz at Mary Hardin-Baylor, an institution that awarded her a scholarship based on her proven musical ability. Somewhat later she studied with Heinrich Gebhard (who also taught Arthur Schnabel and Leonard Bernstein) in Boston, and, after Arthur Rubinstein suggested it, with Alexander Libermann (who also taught Vladimir Horowitz) at Mills College.

While at Smith College she wrote her thesis under the direction of Alfred Einstein, who was at that time the world's leading authority on Mozart. Subsequently, she was the first person to earn the doctorate in organ performance after the University of Texas at Austin began to offer that degree. At various times, she also pursued other musical interests in Germany and at the University of London. At age 32 she suffered a finger injury and decided to make the organ her principal instrument.

Beginning in 1950, Bess held academic positions at Trinity University, San Antonio College and the University of Texas at San Antonio while also filling posts at several religious institutions, as well. True to Bess, this busy schedule of teaching and participating in religious services still offered time to concertize extensively in the U.S. and in Europe. As a pianist, she performed with the Boston Pops Orchestra, the San Antonio Symphony, and the San Antonio Little Symphony. As an organist, she was twice invited to play recitals at Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris and also performed on the organ of Saint-Saens' church, the Madeleine.

In 1991, her international stature as an organist was confirmed as she performed a concert in Tchaikovsky Hall of the Moscow Conservatory under the aegis of the National Russian Music Society. Following the concert she was inducted as a member of the National Russian Music Society, becoming the first woman, the first American, and only the third non-Russian to be so honored. Thus her name was added to a list that included such names as Rachmaninoff, Rimsky-Korsakov, Stravinsky, and Prokofiev. She was invited to return the following year for still another recital.

Bess at FPC

Bess led the First Presbyterian Church Music Department from the organ bench and the choir loft. Hired as the church organist, she expanded the church's music offerings and its role in the greater San Antonio community. At the same time, she instilled in volunteer and professional singers the importance of music in worship and musicality in their worship offerings.

She rarely said much about her personal spiritual beliefs,

which may have led some people to doubt her commitment to such things. If so, those people were mistaken. Her prayers were spoken by the keyboard, and they were both eloquent and sincere.

Bess was a part of the group of organ enthusiasts who assisted the late Bill Hall in launching the organ competition that now bears his name (and continues to be a part of Music@First's annual community offerings), serving as one of its first judges.

She started the Mid-Day Noel series at First Pres nearly 40 years ago, bringing a noon series of vocal and instrumental music to Downtown San Antonio and drawing nearby office workers, church members, tourists, and passersby into our Sanctuary for a welcome holiday respite. The series has continued and will continue as a holiday gift to San Antonio.

One of the first faculty members when the UTSA Music Department of the University of Texas at San Antonio began, she was the first faculty member to be awarded a full professorship. At UTSA, she also supervised the installation of a Casavant organ which was subsequently named in her honor. In 1989 the Bess Hieronymus Scholarship Endowment was established, and in 1994, by the Bess Hieronymus Faculty Endowment at UTSA offered additional recognition. She served on the national board of the Presbyterian Association of Musicians, and directed the Music Conference at Montreat, North Carolina, in 1983.

Some Final Remembrances

Bess Hieronymus had a strong will, great self-confidence, and a self-deprecating sense of humor. (She often referred to the "Ethel Merman" quality of her singing voice.) Her self-confidence was based on a rock-solid foundation of thousands of hours of practice and study, and it surely was transmitted to the other musicians, whether singers or instrumentalists, with whom she was working. It told them that no matter what happened, Bess would get them through. And it told them that they had a responsibility to offer their best musical skills and talents.

For someone with such a varied background and such impressive abilities she never showed signs of ego or superiority. This woman of legendary accomplishments never relied on them to bolster her position. To virtually everyone who came in contact with her, she was simply "Bess."

She also once said, "I admit that I'm a ham." She seemed to love to perform, but she sometimes showed an unexpected shyness. After her death on March 22, 2008, the *San Antonio Express-News* stated that "the life she lived inspired those she loved so deeply their lives are forever changed."

Our October 27 concert is a witness to the truth of those words.

This past month has been a whirlwind as Nate and I started to work with university students and young adults. August and September have been months of transition for university students as they often change locations to go to school. We said "see you later" to our First Pres students who are away at school. Our plan is to be in touch with as many students as possible by updating the contact information for

all college students. Parents of students, you may have already received a phone call!

We've also welcomed university students from Trinity and Incarnate Word who chose to attend First Pres on Sunday mornings with newly made welcome jars and drawstring backpacks. These packets include information about the regular events that we hold for these two groups and invite students to join us. We are inviting these students to be a part of the College and Career Class being taught by Rev. Steve Schaick. Steve is a chaplain in the Air Force and he and his wife, Denise, have made First Pres their home church. Steve will be teaching from *The Red Letter Revolution*, a book by Tony Campolo and Shane Claiborne.

A new partnership between First Pres and Trinity University's InterVarsity Christian Fellowship chapter began as we hosted a luncheon for 20 of the student leaders. 

SAMM SUCCESS STORY House Fire to New Home

On Christmas Day 2012, after Frank and Jessica Valdez and their three children went home to wrap last minute Christmas gifts, Jessica began to smell smoke throughout the house. Shortly after, she walked into the kitchen only to see the entire back of the house on fire.

"I was concerned about my husband," Jessica said. "He was in the back of the house trying to put the fire out." Luckily everyone escaped safely, but all of the Valdez's valuables and possessions were lost.

"I was worried about my kid's things, because it means a lot to them," said Jessica, explaining how many of her children's toys were hers when she was little and could never be replaced.

"The day after the fire I felt so hopeless and broken down. I've never been homeless before, and it made it even harder that it was Christmas time. Usually when you move into another place, you have all of your things, but we had nothing," Jessica explained.

The American Red Cross provided the Valdez's a five-day stay in a hotel. But, at the end of the five days with no prospects for a new home, they had to move in with family. It was then that Frank's mother called SAMMinistries for

help. Filling all requirements, the Valdez family was immediately enrolled in the Rapid Re-Housing Program.

Over a two and a half week period, SAMM began to help the Valdez family replace important documents lost in the fire such as social security cards and birth certificates. SAMM also worked with them in contacting several rental homes within their price range.

SAMM secured a home suitable for the family and SAMM's City of San Antonio Rapid Re-Housing Program paid their initial deposit, as well as, the first month's rent. "It was a relief that the Rapid Re-Housing Program was able to help. I didn't feel alone. If I needed help with something, I knew I could call SAMMinistries."

On January 13, 2013, less than three weeks after the fire, the Valdez family moved into their new home. Within two months,

they no longer needed financial assistance from SAMM.

Because of your help, Jessica says that the Valdez family is returning to a normal life; a feat that could not have been accomplished without SAMMinistries.

The Rapid Re-Housing program is designed to reduce the amount of time people experience homelessness and re-house families into permanent homes. SAMM was able to save the Valdez family from homelessness, and helped them back on their feet in their time of need. It is SAMM's mission to help, serve, and provide for people in need, and we are proud to have taken part in the Valdez's new life.





FPC Supports Fearlessly Faithful Believers

The Global Missions Committee invites you to learn about fellow believers facing persecution for their faith in Jesus Christ

Have you ever wondered why some of our missionaries are only identified by their first name and a vague description of their location? Some of our FPC missionaries are currently serving in countries in which their lives, their ministry, or the lives of the locals who have chosen to follow Christ could be in imminent danger if they are discovered by people who would wish to cause them harm. In fact, 75% of the world's population currently lives in areas with severe religious restrictions or persecution of Christians.

What is persecution?

Persecution is defined as a policy or campaign to exterminate, drive away, or subjugate a people because of their religion, race or beliefs. Some who believe in Christ endure persecution in the form of violent threats, imprisonment, interrogation, and even torture for refusing to deny their faith.



What does the Bible say about persecution?

During his ministry on earth, Jesus warns his friends many times of the risks for those who choose to follow him. In John 15:18, Jesus says, "If the world hates you, keep in mind that it hated me first.." He also teaches how to respond to persecution. "But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you..." (Matthew 5:44)

Many accounts are recorded in the Bible of people who were persecuted because they shared their testimonies of the life, miracles, death, resurrection, and divinity of the person they called Jesus from Nazareth. The book of Acts tells of a man named Saul whose career ambitions included finding, torturing, and killing believers. This highly-feared persecutor was walking to Damascus (in present-day Syria) when Jesus miraculously appeared to him. After that experience, he could no longer deny that Jesus was the Son of God. He changed his entire life and devoted himself to spreading the teachings of Jesus with people near and far. This person, also known as Paul, became a missionary who shared the truth of Jesus Christ across thousands of miles. The formerly feared Paul was now himself a target, however he continued to spread the gospel despite all circumstances. His writings to fellow persecuted believers help us to understand how Christians can react when persecuted. "If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together." (1 Corinthians 12:22) "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." (Romans 12:21) "...God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation." (2 Corinthians 5:17)

How does FPC support Christians in persecuted locations?



Volunteering at Dental Clinic Brings Smiles to All

"Thank you so much!" "God bless you!" "You don't know how much this has helped me!" "Now I can go out and look for a job with confidence." These phrases are often heard by the volunteers and staff at the San Antonio Christian Dental Clinic (SACDC), where hundreds of homeless and low-income individuals receive professional dental care for very little or no cost.

I started volunteering at the SACDC almost two years ago and have witnessed many scenarios in which someone received a new smile, was relieved of excruciating mouth pain, or became able to eat again through the help of the kind volunteer dentists and hygienists there. I so look forward to my shift on Thursday mornings! Sometimes I get to practice my Spanish (which needs lots of practice!), have met some beautiful, spirit -filled, funny, and interesting people there at the clinic. I even had one patient offer to teach me piano lessons! It's a busy place, always buzzing with activity and chatter. I have become close enough with some of the staff that it feels like an extended family. I've come to care about these people that I most likely would not have ever crossed paths with in my regular days of school pick-up and drop-off, to and from the church for meetings or bible study, and the never-ending errand running (I know some of you are saying "that's my schedule too!") I sometimes wish I could volunteer there everyday, and really get to know the patients by name and know their stories, like the staff does. Maybe someday...

As volunteers, we help with patient check-in and check-out, scheduling new appointments, answering phones, filing, preparing patient folders, and any other clerical type duties that the clinic's staff needs help with. The staff there is wonderful, so kind and caring with not only the patients, but also with us volunteers. One of the very special duties we have as volunteers is to pray for our patients and staff. We gather regularly and pray in a group at the clinic, but also have notes that the patients can fill out with their personal prayer requests. The notes are collected in a jar and the volunteers and staff can pick up a few and pray for those patients throughout the week. Most of the requests ask for prayers for job search and family matters, but there are some that I've seen that I will carry in my heart for a long time – even if I don't know the person who made the request, it is a privilege to carry those specific prayers to God while sharing my own. The SACDC is a very special place doing its part to help make Jesus visible to many San Antonio residents.

We are always looking for new volunteers! The shifts are half day, morning or afternoon, whichever fits into your schedule. We have training manuals and new volunteers go through a training period with another volunteer who is familiar with the system. There are usually 2-4 volunteers per shift, plus the staff, who are so grateful that we are there! If you are looking for a new way to make Jesus visible and would like to share some of your time and talent, please consider volunteering at the San Antonio Christian Dental Clinic. The History Corner

"Not My Will but Thine be Done"—Scripture in Stained Glass

On the north side of our sanctuary near the chancel is one of the most powerful scenes depicted in our stained glass windows. Jesus is shown earnestly praying in the Garden of Gethsemane as a golden beam of light from heaven lights His face. This beautiful window was a gift from Dr. Frederick Llewellyn Thomson in memory of his parents, Walter and Christina Thomson. The window was installed when the sanctuary was remodeled and enlarged in 1924. Since the window is on an inside wall, it is illuminated by use of a light box.

According to Luke's gospel, on the night before his arrest, Jesus went with his disciples to the Mount of Olives. Upon reaching the place, he said to them, "Pray that you may not come into the time of trial." Then he withdrew from them about a stone's throw away, knelt down and prayed, "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me; yet not my will but yours be done." Then an angel from heaven appeared to him and gave him strength. And

being in anguish, he prayed more earnestly until his sweat was like drops of blood falling to the ground.

Frederick Llewellyn Thomson was born in Canada about 1875 near the Lake of the Woods in Ontario. He attended McGill University in Montreal and then medical school in Scotland, his father's native country. Although he became a licensed medical doctor, he apparently never practiced medicine but was referred to as Dr. Thomson for the rest of his life.

In 1897, Dr. Thomson immigrated to the U.S. making his home in the East Texas town of Grayburg in Hardin County near Houston. Since he had worked in the timber industry as a young man in Canada, there is speculation that the pine for-



ests of East Texas are what drew him to that area. After moving to Texas, he married and in 1910, his wife, Eddie, gave birth to their first child, Dorothy. Their son, Frederick Llewellyn Thomson, Jr. was born about six years later.

Always an active entrepreneur, Thomson became involved in oil exploration which led to his formation of the Grayburg Oil Company which was involved in the oil boom in the Spindle top area of East Texas in the 1920's.

After moving to San Antonio, Thomson continued in the oil business as president of the Grayburg Oil Company. The Church Register indicates that the family joined First Presbyterian Church April 2, 1922; Dr. F. L. Thomson by profession of faith, Mrs. F. L. Thomson by statement and their daughter, Miss Dorothy Thomson by profession of faith.

On November 16, 1942, the Express-News announced that Dr. Thomson died at his

home at 322 Rosemary in Alamo Heights. He was sixty-eight years old. He was survived by his widow, Mrs. Eddie N. Thomson, daughter Mrs. Aden Stiles (Dorothy Thomson Stiles) and son Frederick L. Thomson, Jr. Services were held at First Presbyterian Church with Rev. Dr. Patrick D. Miller officiating. Interment was at Mission Burial Park.

At least two descendents of Dr. Frederick L. Thomson and Eddie Thomson continue as members of First Presbyterian... their grandchildren, Trisha Chilcutt and Ethel Runion.

²² But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law. (Gal 5:22-23 NIV)

A careful reading of Paul's letter to the Galatians will reveal that he is speaking to a community of Gentile Christians much like us. In chapter five, we stumble upon a list of vices that we are quick to pass over because they are not pleasant to contemplate. Freedom to Serve

The deacons at First Presbyterian Church meet once a month for dinner, study, and fellowship. Typically the meetings include among other agenda items a discussion in large or small groups of a reading assignment related to the deacons' caregiving mission. Currently, we are reading *Christian Caregiving-a Way of Life*, by Kenneth C. Haugk. Last month, we read and discussed the chapter "Servanthood vs. Servitude," which I found very practical.

The author begins the chapter by quoting Martin Luther: "A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all." At first, that seemed like a contradiction or a paradox—how could we be a lord of all and a servant of all at the same time? Then he contrasted **servitude** vs. **servanthood**. Servitude is involuntary work done out of compulsion, perhaps motivated by a sense of duty, guilt or fear of not pleasing God enough. It is what we do

because we have to. However, servanthood is work done voluntarily, not out of compulsion but rather willingly out of a sense of commitment and love. It is what we do because we choose to.

What a different perspective we have when we realize we have freedom to share God's love with others rather than having to earn God's grace through our good works. Another point the author makes is that we each have been given different gifts as Christian servants. Therefore we cannot each expect to serve every person in need. But we are each called to use our gifts as best we can.

Haugk quotes Jesus as defining servanthood, "the Son of man came not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Matt. 20:28).

Do I even want to attend social gatherings?

Do I need to develop a game plan just to get through?

Grief and the Holidays is a workshop designed to help those who are grieving and their families to better understand the grief process, how it affects us during the holidays, and how we can use this special time to continue to heal.


