Living to Make Jesus Visible Making Jesus Visible at Schools By Joe Rust

Many dedicated San Antonio teachers have a certain special plaque in either their home or in their classroom.

The plaque carries the "One Hundred Years From Now" words of poet Forest Witcraft, to wit:

One hundred years from now
It won't matter
What kind of car I drove
What kind of house I lived in
How much money I had in the bank
Nor what my clothes looked like
But
The world may be a little better
Because I was important
In the life of a child.

The same kind of dedication to the future of our young people is exemplified in the participation by 23 people working with a local educational program of San Antonio Youth Literacy (SAYL) and under sponsorship of our church. Most of the participants are members of the church, with a few being friends or coworkers with church members.

It is the SAYL second grade Reading Buddy Program, an early intervention program focused on promoting the literacy skills of elementary school-aged children who are at risk of school failure due to poor reading skills. Reading Buddies is just one of the SAYL programs in which volunteers are trained to work one -on-one with youngsters who are in need of educational help.

The First Presbyterian folks are working at W.W. White Elementary School and Douglass Elementary School on the East Side and Barkley-Ruiz Elementary School on the West Side. Each spends an hour at their assigned school each week,

divided into two 30-minute periods in reading with a different assigned child.

The reading is important, but perhaps the greatest asset is the working relationship with each child, testified by the smiles on the faces of each youngster when their Reading Buddy arrives and in the swells in the loving heart of each adult reader as she or he leaves each session. Educational regulations prevent the adult readers from discussing religion with the youngsters, but there is no doubt that each reader exhibits, as Christian examples, living to make Jesus visible in each reading session. There is also no doubt that each adult reader has benefitted as much, or more, from this program than have their mentees.

First Presbyterian readers are Mary and Craig Bell, Nancy and Harold Black, Kirby Carpenter, Amanda and Jeff Hochenedel, Robin Hudnall, James McCann, Pat O'Neill, Nancy Puckett, Gordon Richardson, Clinton Rogers, Joe Rust, Austin Walker, Holly Youngquist and Amy and Hal Zesch, White Elementary; Irma Martinez, Teresa and Ben McCaleb and Jan Zeppelin, Barkley-Ruiz Elementary, and Kristin Zeppelin, Douglass Elementary.

Our church first became involved in the Reading Buddy Program last fall, when church member Kirby Carpenter, whose business is near White Elementary, brought attention to the church about the program and arranged training sessions at the church for the program. Kirby is the program's angel for First Presbyterian, and he is due plaudits for determining to make Christ visible to these schoolchildren.

Witness some of the comments made by readers regarding this valuable program:

Craig: "Both Mary and I are blessed to be in a church group that decided to step out. Kirby found the place and the group to work with San Antonio Youth Literacy. We have worked at White Elementary since October. Each week is not filled with miracles, but it is an opportunity to give our love to four individuals on a weekly basis.

We'll be ending our time together with these students, and, for sure, we're hoping we have made an impact on their future, mainly because they've made an impact on ours. I see it as a 'trust God' thing. Mary was teacher, but that was never my job. She helped me when I needed it,



but most importantly, our goal was to 'love our neighbor as ourselves,' especially when they lived more than 20 miles from where some of my 'other' neighbors live. Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow, realizing that it make 'living to make Jesus visible' something closer to my heart."

Amanda and Jeff: "We look forward to seeing our Reading Buddies each week, and we are so amazed at the progress they have made and the relationships that we have developed."

Nancy and Harold: "We agree with Marlon Davis, principal at W.W. White, when recently he said that reading literacy is the stated purpose of the SAYL program, but the true first function of the Reading Buddy Program is relationship a one-on-one relationship that encourages improvement in reading skills."

Gordon: "On my students' parts, there is a real interest, even an eagerness, in learning to read. In one semester, they've improved from 1.6 (a little over halfway through the first grade reading level) to 3.1 (more than into the third grade) and 1.5 to 2.7. They are a blessing to me. I love them."

Joe: "Each time I am with my two Reading Buddies, I see renewed hope in our future generation, as opposed to the depression I often feel in being a substitute teacher in some local schools." **Ben:** "Teresa and I recently each have been blessed with two pony-tailed Reading Buddies at Barkley-Ruiz Elementary on the West Side. The girls and us obviously are mutually benefitted by our time together and Teresa and I get the extra benefit of serving alongside each other, while enjoying a

weekly 'lunch date.' The not-so-obvious benefit is a tiny foothold for First Presbyterian Church in the zip code with one of the highest teen birthrates in the country and the highest crime rate in the city. What an opportunity for FPC to expand our presence in this neighborhood and dream about how we could 'make Jesus visible' there!"

Nancy Puckett: "Reading can help a child soar to new levels. Some children need extra help or encouragement to be a successful reader. Each week when I enter the doors of W.W. White

Elementary School, I realize I am offering that help and encouragement. The big smiles I am greeted with make me know I am making a difference, being visible and stepping up to develop those needed reading skills. One of my students summed it up by saying, 'I wish you could come every day.'

The other child told me she now has her entire family reading with her and she reads to her younger sister each evening. Yes, just a few hours each week changes lives."

The Quiroga Family is Home!

The fence is installed. The landscape is completed. Working together San Antonio Presbyterian church members (Cluster Build volunteers) and the Quiroga family have completed the 2013 Habitat Home!

What joy there was at the Quiroga's home dedication and blessing on March 23: Lilana (6) Giovanni (5) and Aidne (4) now have their very own home! Mom and Dad will be paying \$450 per month until their mortgage is paid off. Juan (a maintenance man) and Nancy (a food server) were determined to become homeowners and today they are living that dream!

Now it is time to look toward the Presbyterian Cluster 2014 Habitat Home. Habitat families on average: have a family income of \$25,000; an income equal to 44% of our San Antonio median income; furthermore, 50% of the families are single parent families. The families must give 150

hours of "sweat equity" to other Habitat homes, the Habitat warehouse, home store or office before their home is started. They must attend 12 classes that prepare them for home ownership – everything from maintenance, to conflict mediation, to landscaping. They must earn a total of 300 hours of "sweat equity."

Joan Chittister's book, The Gift of Years, explores many themes about aging and how spirituality may influence how we live out those golden years. For many, that time of life offers those much-anticipated years of travel, enjoying hobbies and friends or just sleeping late on weekday mornings! But for others—and what is becoming more the norm—is the role of caregiver for a spouse or aging parents. Whether this is perceived as an increased burden or a blessing, the caregiver must now learn a new role. A role in which, not only are the responsibilities great, the focus has changed from the caregiver's own life to providing care for someone who once was independent. Depending on how well the caregiver copes in this new role will determine how they manage their caregiving status. Regardless of how well the caregiver is coping, spirituality may be one way to come to terms with the inevitability of aging and all that comes with it.

We often hear that the caregivers need to take care of themselves in order to be better in their caregiving role. But how do they manage this when the reality of emotional overload can be overwhelming? How does the caregiver find the time or energy to deal with both the physical and psychological demands of caregiving? Using spirituality through prayer, reflection or meditation can sustain the

caregiver during difficult times. Another way is to become an advocate for those in their care by learning the latest caregiving techniques and practices. Increasing their caregiving knowledge and skills provides the caregiver with confidence in their ability to effectively care for their loved ones.

FPC Has Joined The Fellowship of Presbyterians

Questions and Answers

- **Q.** How do we relate to the PC(USA) now that we have joined The Fellowship?
- A. The decision, affirmed by vote of the session, was to join The Fellowship and remain within our denomination. We have not left and are still a part of the PC(USA). We have joined a group of churches within the PC(USA) who continue to actively affirm what the Bible and our current Book of Confessions teaches. We will cooperate with these churches, learn from them, and reach out with them to the World for Christ.
- **Q.** Are we no longer a "big tent" church now that we have joined The Fellowship?
- Our church doors are open to all who seek a place of worship and an opportunity to grow as disciples of Jesus Christ. We are still a "big tent" church in terms of membership, but have chosen to limit and unify our official beliefs and acceptable teaching to what our denomination has traditionally taught. This mirrors what the PC(USA) has traditionally practiced in terms of beliefs: visitors are not asked to agree to anything. New members are simply asked to turn from evil and to affirm that Jesus Christ is the Lord of their lives. Candidates for ordination to church office are held to a still higher standard. They are additionally required to affirm the essential tenets of the reformed faith as found in The Book of Confessions, subordinate to the Bible itself. By joining The Fellowship, we stand united with other PC(USA) churches who intend to believe and to teach the tenets of our faith as found in The Book of Confessions, as further highlighted by the "Essential

Tenets" section of "The Fellowship Theology Project" found on pages 5-8 at:

fellowshippres.wpengine.netdna-cdn.com/wp-content/uploads/Theology10.pdf

Officers are charged with overseeing the faithful biblical teaching of our congregation, and therefore it is important that the teaching at First Presbyterian continue to be biblical and unified.

- Q. But doesn't the PC(USA) as a whole affirm its own Book of Confessions?
- A. The PC(USA) says that it does. However, the PC(USA) is in the process of actively embracing beliefs which are contradicted in The Book of Order and The Book of Confessions. It has begun teaching that The Book of Confessions is merely a historical record of what the church has believed over time. Our Book of Order states that the confessions, though subordinate to the Bible, "are nevertheless standards." We believe this mishandling of our constitutional beliefs is tearing our denomination apart and presenting a poor witness to "the Way, the Truth, and the Life" found only in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. We want to draw a line in the sand to stand with the Bible and with our current Constitution as Presbyterians.
- **Q.** What is ECO and are we a part of it?
- A. ECO, "A Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians," is a new and separate presbyterian and reformed denomination. ECO happens also to exist within the greater umbrella of The Fellowship of Presbyterians. We, however, have voted to remain within the PC(USA) and have no plans to leave. Being a member of The Fellowship does not obligate us to join ECO in the future.
- **Q.** But what will all this accomplish?
- A. One valuable thing it will accomplish, besides taking a stand for the truth, is that it will release us from concentrating on theological arguments and free us to get back to the work of the Church: to fulfill the Great Commission given to us by Christ and to "Live to Make Jesus Visible" to our neighbors and our World. Money Matter\$ at FPC

Ever wonder about finances at FPC?

If you do, you are not alone. In fact, a few weeks ago a handful of people from our congregation questioned the \$100,000 gift that our elders gave to Childress Memorial Church of God in Christ after their building was destroyed by fire. The concern arose in light of the information published in the bulletin and the First Press newsletter that we had received \$139,000 less than expected in the month of January. This question gives a great opportunity to bring clarity and transparency.

What is important to understand is that FPC has an operating budget and special funds. The operating budget is prepared each year as a plan for how we believe the Lord is calling us to carry out ministry and mission. Our budget is determined much like a household or a business would prepare a budget for both income and expenses. At FPC we operate on a fiscal year that runs from January thru December. Each year, in the late spring, committees and staff members begin to work on plans for the next year and submit budget proposals. Those are reviewed and edited by the Stewardship and Finance Committee and submitted to the Session in October as a

draft. In November a final form is submitted to the Session for approval. The annual budget includes: employee compensation (salaries and benefits), program expenses, facility and utility expenses, administrative expenses and benevolences. The operating budget for 2013, as approved by the Session is \$4,792,200. It is supported by pledged giving and unpledged giving.

In addition to the operating budget, we have special funds. Special funds are gifts that are received such as bequests, estates, and memorial gifts. These gifts are approved by the session and put into special accounts which have restricted or unrestricted purposes. The restrictions, if any, may be set by the donor and/or the session. The gift to Childress Memorial was taken from a special fund—The Ferguson Fund, which was established with a gift in excess of \$300,000. There were no restrictions on this gift other than that it be used at the discretion of the elders. In fact, when Ferguson family members were informed about the use of this gift, they were delighted.

The staff and the elders at First Presbyterian desire continually to be good stewards of the gifts which are received. Our ministries and our mission, both locally and globally, are supported because of your continued generosity. 

When Grief Turns to Grace

Families With Mental Illness Helping One Another

Barbara and Mike drive an hour and fifteen minutes each way to attend the NAMI (National Alliance for Mental Illness) Family-to-Family class taught every Wednesday evening at FPC. After attending the second class of twelve last fall Barbara said, "We had no idea until we started taking this class that our daughter had an undiagnosed mental illness. One of our friends told us about the course and that it might help us understand our daughter's difficult behavior. Now that we understand the illness better and we have learned how to help our daughter, we have hope for her future and ours". Barbara and Mike are now taking the class a second time to help continue to educate themselves and to learn from the other class participants who are also struggling to help their family member with a mental illness.

Barbara and Mike are unique only in that they drive such a long distance from their home to attend the class once a week. They are just one of the over 100 families who have taken the course at FPC over the past three years. They are just two of the many parents and family members who have gone to extraordinary lengths to educate themselves, to help their loved one who is ill and who have been willing to share their story so that others may not feel the isolation and hopelessness that so many families feel.

FPC has opened its doors and extended a hand to comfort

those with burdens greater than most people can imagine. Besides the once a week course during the fall and spring that is taught to families, FPC sponsors and conducts a Mental Health Family Support Group on the first and third Tuesday of each month. Calls come into the Support Group leaders from parents desperate to find a place where someone will listen and where they can unload their burden for an hour and a half. Mothers and dads and siblings and aunts come together for healing and find that they often help heal others who are similarly broken with grief and despair.

But grief and despair are funny things. In the company of others who suffer and who have had little hope, their own grief often turns to grace and their despair to hope. The miracles of healing and the blessing of sharing their hurts with others helps lift families up, helps make their faith even stronger and leaves them in a place where they feel loved and accepted.

FPC. Caring for others, rebuilding lives through faith and giving hope to families that had all but given up. Living to make Jesus visible.
