New Perspective for the New Year? Here's Something to Think About



I recently received a letter from a friend, Steve Cooper, in Houston, Texas. Steve is a wonderful man of God who has a burning desire to "wake the passion" for Christ in men across the country. I have known Steve and his family for many years and have been blessed by them and their love for the Lord.

Steve writes: "Sitting at our daughter Laura's rehearsal dinner, her soon-to-be father-in-law, Jody, gave the final toast. He said, 'A marriage can be successful if a husband and wife practice four things.' Then came the four things: 'Lie, steal, drink, cheat.' What? My heart raced. I glanced at Karen. Why would he say this? What was he thinking!? Jody's follow-up answered my questions. Lie...in each other's arms. Steal...time to be together. Drink...from the cup of love. Cheat...death beyond fifty years of marriage."

I couldn't help but chuckle when I was reading Steve's letter but then I also couldn't help but reflect on what wise and timely advice Jody provided. As we enter into this New Year, I know many of you have already made New Year's resolutions—and even more of us have already broken the resolutions we have made! But I want to encourage you to join me in making 2013 a year that we will "Lie, Steal, Drink, and Cheat."

But if you do the math, you discover that by continuing to accelerate at 15mph/day, you will eventually reach Dawn's cruising speed of 24,500 mph, making it one of NASA's fastest spacecrafts. Funding the Work of the Kingdom: Budgeting and Stewardship at FPC

In late May we begin the church year planning process – ministries, missions, program components, budgets all are subject to staff review and careful assessment of resources allocated, used and projected future needs. Our goal is to present a preliminary estimate of the human, physical, and program resources we anticipate we'll need to Worship, Grow, and Serve as First Presbyterian Church of San Antonio.

It's not an easy process – determining priorities is never a slam-dunk effort, especially in a church with many different ministries, programs and outreach efforts, each of which has funding and staffing needs.

A draft budget, prepared and presented to the Budget Subcommittee of our Stewardship and Finance Committee for discussion and refinement, is just the beginning. Discussions and refinements continue through the early fall, with a goal of having the budget before the Session for review in October and for adoption in November. In the middle of this process, we begin our annual stewardship campaign – that time in which we ask FPC members and friends to prayerfully consider their support for the church's ministries and programs.


This year, the Session received the report of the Budget Committee on the first draft of the 2013 Budget, presented by Stewardship and Finance at its October meeting. At its November meeting, the Session received and approved a \$4,792,200 budget for 2013, representing a 5.6% increase over the 2012 budget. Prior to approval, discussion centered on the reasons for proposed increases in funding, updates on pledge and unpledged giving patterns, and the budget process The 2013 budget continues and expands our ministry and our mission in the community and the world.



Discipling Program Plans To Expand In 2013

"Now teach these truths to other trustworthy people who will be able to pass them on to others." (2 Timothy 2:2 NLT)

Men at FPC will be discipling each other through 2013, using as a study guide, "Four Priorities," by Rev. Dr. John Tolson, according to Men's Ministry coordinator Doug Beach. Meeting in pairs, they will explore what it means to become a man of Christ and will how to disciple others.

This year's discipling effort begins in January and will meet for 28 weeks. There will be periodic gatherings of all the men who are participating to share fellowship and lessons learned. The Men's Ministry team hopes to have 18-20 newcomers to join with those who participated in the 2012 program launch, and many already have expressed interest. "Our goal is to reach every man at FPC in a discipling relationship," Doug says.

Wednesday Ladies Bible Study Lisa Harper's <u>Malachi: A Love That Never Lets Go</u>

This Spring session of the Wednesday night Ladies' Bible Class devotes eight sessions to the Old Testament book of Malachi — a study of God's mercy. A time for fellowship precedes video and class discussion The class meets at 6:30 p.m. in Room 302 January 9—March 6, but doesn't meet on February 13. It offers a fresh perspective on Malachi which is more than a book about tithing. On our worst day, God doesn't walk away from us. And His love for us is not determined by our performance. "I the LORD do not change" Malachi 3:6.

Sessions include topics such as "When Your Tara's Trashed and Your Dog Is Dead (Study Background & Introduction),: Going Big or Going Home; Our Creator is a Committed Family Man; When Divine Grace Masquerades as Discipline; God's Miraculous Return on Our Meager Investments; and The Promise of Pirouetting Livestock.

Men's Ministry seeks to build a greater sense of community and involvement by strengthening bonds of friendship and faith. If you're interested in learning more about becoming a disciple or about discipling others, contact Doug (210 247-2616—doug.beach@ymail.com.

The book is secondary to what this is all about, according to Mitch Huffman and Mike Wood who have put the book to work in their lives and in their relationship to Christ during the past year. They agree that there's an accountability to each other that has developed over the past year as they have studied, prayed with, confided in and encouraged each other on a weekly basis. And they'll tell you that "going down the road together keeps you going forward."

The discipling effort grew out of Men's Ministry gatherings for breakfast at The Quarry each month and out of a realization that forming deeper relationships with other men made the walk with Christ more meaningful. Last year, 24 men - 12 pairs - began the journey through the Tolson book and through their own lives. Through a creative mix of relevant case studies and scriptural illustrations, they found an easy-to-understand and practical "tool kit" for balancing the four priorities - Christ, self, relationships, and commitment to the world.

"It's an ideal way of strengthening our church family from within," Mitch says. "A year ago I didn't know Mike; now we have a lasting friendship founded solely on our shard faith. Some of the questions that you are asked to consider force you to really search yourself some are easy, others become more difficult. When you have a person who you can trust and talk with honestly, it's very beneficial. Finally, being involved in the Discipleship Study has helped me apply my faith outside of church, both at work and at home. And the upshot is that a life of faith is a way of life, not a ritual."

Mike echoed that, saying "I thought I was doing a pretty good job - I grew up in this church, went to Sunday School, followed all the standard practices, but the more I considered and participated in discipling with Mitch, the more I realized there was so much to learn that I couldn't afford to not become immersed. Now it's my turn - and Mitch's turn - to disciple two other FPC men who are seeking to focus on these priorities."

Both Mitch and Mike say that their year together— the application of what they've learned and the accountability to practice their faith—has strengthened family relationships and friendships. And they agree that talking with others about their faith is much easier after having explored it together. "Now we welcome the opportunity to talk with anyone," they say.

New Adult Sunday School Class

The Bereans, a new Adult Sunday School class, begins Sunday, January 6, in the St. Andrews Room. Taught by Dr. Jerry Hardwick, it will cover the foundational doctrines and concepts of Christianity.

The name, "Bereans" comes from Acts 17 where we read: "Now the Bereans were of more noble character than the Thessalonians, for they received the message with great eagerness and examined the Scriptures every day to see if what Paul said was true." (v.11,NIV) The Bereans' eager dedication to the guidance of scripture has inspired Bible study groups, Sunday school classes, churches and even denominations to adopt the name.

"The class format will include lecture and discussion methods conducive to interactive fellowship and is open to all ages," Jerry says. "Your Bible is our resource, and we will follow the topical outline of the Westminster Confession of Faith which begins with, 'Of The Holy Scripture'."

A graduate of Austin Presbyterian Seminary (MDiv,'85) he led The Bereans class at FPC some 20 years ago in the same St. Andrews Room. Jerry and Maggie have been associated with First Presbyterian Church since 1985. He is a former USAF Chaplain, and they served with Campus Crusade for Christ, Military Ministry.

"In this time of economic uncertainty, the church has the opportunity to declare a message of hope, Scott notes. "While serving the poor and the needy of San Antonio and the world we, the people of God, have the opportunity to witness to an alternative way of life, a simpler lifestyle that is not dependent on worldly success. Indeed, the quiet revolution of God's love and forgiveness in Jesus Christ may be easier for people to hear as they realize that they cannot secure their own material well-being."

Sabbath appears in the Bible—"The Sabbath was made for man and not man for the Sabbath." and "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy" are among the many phrases we remember as parts of our religious heritage. And we and many others consider the Sabbath as a day of rest and worship.

Like clockwork each year the wreaths and red bows appear. The Christmas tree is in the Mauze Lobby. Garlands festoon the railing




Shelly Harrell Reminisces . . .

A Bit of the Story of Our Nativity Scene

A number of years ago - 12-15 or so - Mary Pat Stumberg called me and asked if I would like to help her put up the Nativity Scene at the church . . . the one in the area called "The Tower" lobby. Mary Pat had been in charge of the crèche for at least that many years. I was happy for the opportunity to help, and she showed me where the items were being stored.

We used an old stable and some all-white china figures that, we understood, Kip Zbinden had purchased at a garage sale – and we were amazed that the grouping included an elephant!! The figures were nice and were used for years. A few years later Mary Pat "retired" from the crèche responsibility and turned it over to me, we thought it would be a good time to "spiff up" the scene.

By that time the Baby Jesus figure was truly wrapped tightly because he had been broken to pieces. We think a curious child may have held it and accidentally dropped it - it was found in many pieces on the floor. The Baby Jesus figure was patched up and is still in use.



A number of years ago I asked Katy Zbinden Farrimond to help me set up the creche at the same time the flower committee members and friends are decorating the halls. We decorate the table, place the crèche and try to protect it as a viewing site. When it has been up for a couple of weeks, we hang the star over the scene to announce the approaching Birth of Christ.

After the holiday season, we put each item back in the same large box it has been stored in for many years, carefully wrapping baby Jesus, Mary and Joseph, the Wise Men and the Shepherds so that they will be ready for next year's Advent and Christmas. We always appreciate the church staff members who help us in so many ways - lifting the heavy box and bringing it from storage to the Tower area, hanging the star, helping us to place the components, and then assisting us with properly storing it for the next year.

We have a special feeling for the crèche and hope that you do also. We think it will be cherished and used during Advent and Christmas for many years to come.
