That was often a question we asked our kids when we would travel on family vacations this time of year. Whether it was driving to the mountains of Colorado or the beaches of Florida, we would often look for the "Golden Arches." Of course, people are still looking for

However, I recently read an interesting article that gave me a new appreciation for looking for the "Golden Arches." Plan to stay after worship and enjoy this free church-wide event. Bring friends to worship and stay for lunch. You'll be glad you did.

Rebuilding, Resilience, and Restoration in Toms River, New Jersey

An interview by Claire Plantenga with FPC member Candy Wagner

When Hurricane Sandy hit New Jersey last October, our brothers and sisters in Christ at Toms River Presbyterian Church witnessed the 820-mile wide storm devastate every aspect of their lives. Even though many of those affected continue to suffer immense, ongoing feelings of grief and loss, they have chosen as a congregation of believers to accept the reality that a God who loves, redeems, and restores can work even in the midst of their brokenness to make Jesus visible to their community.

Our congregation had the privilege of participating in their ministry of rebuilding homes and restoring hope in New Jersey earlier this year. FPC member Candy Wagner shares her experiences in New Jersey in the interview below. A second group of FPC members will travel to Toms River in August to continue in this outreach. Thank you, to all who have supported our FPC members through your finances and prayers to serve Hurricane Sandy survivors in New Jersey.

What image will remain in your memory when you think about this trip? Describe what you are thinking of and why the image is so clear and lasting.

Actually, there are two images. The first is the image of walking into the house we were going to work on for the first time. I can still see the destruction and smell the smell from the damage the water had done and feeling so overwhelmed and just trying to imagine what the people who lived there were feeling and going through! My heart just broke for them, especially as we moved out their remaining belongings to begin to work. The second image is, of course, of the house four days later. The house was all cleaned out with new sheetrock and subflooring. It was so amazing to be a part of it all and see it happen and to see how God worked through all of us! The memory is so clear and lasting because none of us knew what we were in for and God gave each of us special strength and skills to make it happen! There are so many

other things like being part of a team, making new friends and building special relationships. And of course, John's leadership (and patience) was amazing!

What were your favorite activities during the day? During the evening?

Working with the team was wonderful! But, as crazy as it sounds, our lunch break was wonderful. We drove to the WaWa, which is the local convenience store, bought our lunch and all sat in our suburban where we said grace, ate our lunch and talked about the morning's work and shared together. It was a special and fun time! John got us all together each evening to go over our day, to pray and to share with each other about where we had seen Jesus that day. A very special time!

Were you able to use gifts from God that you already knew you had been given? Did you feel like you excelled in an area that you didn't expect?

I do have a God gift of being an encourager and I was certainly able to use that. God surprised me everyday giving me strength I never knew I had and abilities I never had before! Who would have ever thought that I would be hanging sheet rock?

What advice would you give to others who may want to participate in mission trips?

GO! If you feel God's call, answer Him and go. He will give you the skills you need beyond your imagination and He will use you in ways you have never imagined! And, you will receive so much more than you give. You will be blessed to be a blessing!

On Friday, April 12, participants of the small group ministry at First Presbyterian Church connected at the End of the Year

Celebration. Small groups usually meet in homes as a, well, small group. They study the Scripture and pray together. Each semester they undertake a service project. They do a lot of things together, but they do it in small groups. The End of the Year Celebration was their chance to come together under one roof as a large group and celebrate all that occurred since last September.

However, the event wasn't just a social time; it was also an opportunity to make Jesus visible to the people served by the San Antonio Food Bank. It began with a scrumptious dinner that was ca-

tered by Catalyst Catering, the social enterprise of the Food Bank, which generates funding with its services. A food donation competition gave individual groups the opportunity to win the "Distinguished Honor of Winning" by bringing the most food to donate, measured in pounds. Bill and Linda Ruhmann's group won with almost 200 pounds of food. Food collected and donated by all groups was almost 500 pounds. Eric Cooper, president and CEO of the Food Bank, gave back to the gathering by delivering an inspiring story of hope, forgiveness and redemption as he described the work of the Food Bank and how hunger had touched his own family.

The food competition was only one way for a group to show that they were the best, all in fun, of course. A donation to

the Food Bank of at least a dollar bought Braggin' Bucks which gave group members the opportunity to extol the virtues of their particular group. It seems several groups have the best snacks. Other groups told how their service project helped the community as well as brought members closer together. There were stories about friendships made and strengthened and the care given to members in times of crisis. It was clear that for each member the best group is their own group because it is the place where they are accepted and cared for just as they are.

The next year of small groups begins in September with signups on Sunday, September 8. More information will be publicized during the summer. We also need facilitators. Our family has just concluded track, the last activity of the school year. It makes me recall my cousin's last track meet years ago. He ran the 800 meters, once believed to be an endurance race, and now has become an all-out grueling two lap sprint.

My cousin had raced against the same boy for four years, always coming up short; this would be their last encounter. The other boy was ranked number one in the state. My uncle could barely contain himself as the coach explained the strategy for this final race. My cousin would remain right on the other boy's heels, just a hair away from clipping him with every stride. The idea was to wear the other kid out, and for the last two hundred meters my cousin would kick with everything he had for the finish line. My uncle stated, "Sounds good," and invited the coach to join him at the finish line. The coach declined. My uncle was shocked and asked why. The

The race unfolded just as the old coach predicted, and on the last 200 meters you could begin to see my cousin shake in agony and it looked as though he was losing faith. Almost in total obedience and with a new sense of strength, my cousin sprinted to the finish line, completely defeating the entire competition. Everyone minus the coach was waiting at the finish line to celebrate.

Is it any different in our own lives? Everyone wants to be there waiting for us to celebrate when we win, but our Father is the one who has a winning plan for us, knows when we will feel the most desolate, the most abandoned, the most lacking in faith, and He is there standing beside us yelling NOW. I encourage you to evaluate your own life and for just a small moment not concentrate on the pain or doubt you may be experiencing, and I actually believe you will hear our Lord telling you, NOW.

How Session Works

The Purpose of All Worship

Worship is a multi-faceted and miraculous practice of Christian discipleship. In the act of worship we hear God's Word read, sung, and proclaimed. We confront and confess our sins, voice our prayers, affirm our beliefs, and offer our gifts to God. We learn ways to apply scripture in our lives and, by the work of the Holy Spirit, are transformed to better serve God in the world. It is in worship that we observe the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper, acknowledging our need for God's grace and remembering Jesus Christ's sacrificial love for us. Despite all of the benefits we receive, we must never forget that the purpose of all worship is to praise and glorify God!

The Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) or "Book of Order" dedicates an entire section to the practice of worship. Known as the "Directory for Worship" (Directory), it is not a service book with fixed orders of worship, a collection of prayers and rituals, or a program guide. Rather it describes the theology that underlies Reformed worship and outlines appropriate forms for that worship. This theology is based on the Bible and instructed by the Book of Confessions. Recognizing that there are many ways for devoted Christians to express love and praise for God, the Directory offers congregations a great deal of leeway in styling appropriate worship. Decisions about how worship is practiced in each Presbyterian church are the responsibility of the session of that church--the pastors (teaching elders) and the elders (ruling elders). In making decisions, the session is charged to seek openness to the creativity of the Holy Spirit, who guides the church toward worship which is orderly yet spontaneous, consistent with God's Word, and open to the newness of God's future.3

As you can imagine, many elements combine to create meaningful and powerful worship. Sessions refer to the Directory for guidance about all kinds of details: time, place, materials, and music, for example. There are explanations about activities that should be included in Reformed services and suggestions for how to order them appropriately. There are clear instructions about the session's responsibilities for Baptism and the Lord's Supper. The Directory also addresses many types of worship services besides those on Sunday mornings: healing services, weddings, memorial services, ordinations, etc.

You might be interested to know that the scope of worship, as it is addressed in the Directory, reaches far beyond formal

church services. Section W-1.1005b states: *The Christian Community worships and serves God (1) in shared experiences of life, (2) in personal discipleship, (3) in mutual ministry, and (4) in common ministry in the world.* Accordingly, the session is charged with responsibility for educating and nurturing church members in practices of personal worship and discipleship. With the deacons, the session is called to extend pastoral care to those in need. In fact, everything that a congregation is led to undertake in mission and evangelism is regarded as a worship opportunity!

On behalf of the Session, I encourage you to explore what the Book of Order's Directory of Worship has to teach us about praising and glorifying God. Specifically, Chapters V, VI and VII contain wonderful information about worshipping the Lord in personal quiet time, in our homes, in our service within the church, and as we seek to make Jesus visible in the world. Arthur Newton: A Century of Christian Service

One of the most loyal attendees at the second traditional worship service at First Presbyterian Church each Sunday is a spry 100-year-old man who sports a dry wit and a contagious, almost mischievous, smile.

He is Arthur Newton, a fourth-generation First Presbyterian member, retired scientist, and friend to many.

Arthur was born the youngest of six children to Carrie Boyle Newton and Frank Richards Newton on May 27, 1913, in a nolonger-existing home on Flores Street near what now is Fox Tech High School. He attended Stephen F. Austin and Travis elementary schools, Mark Twain Middle School, old Main Avenue High School (now Fox Tech), as a member of the last graduating class in 1931, and the San Antonio Junior College before entering the University of Texas at Austin, where he majored in zoology and received a degree in bacteriology. While at UT, he was a member of Beta Theta Pi fraternity and still attends gatherings of the Beta alums in San Antonio.

He joined the U.S. Army shortly after our nation entered World War II, serving in a mobile hospital in Europe. Near the end of the war, he escaped being shot by about 15 feet when a German pilot strafing a convoy overshot his target and fired (hopefully in error) on the hospital where Arthur was serving.

After the war, he re-entered UT and received a master's degree in mycology, a branch of microbiology specializing in fungi. He remained in the Army, serving during the Korean War in Tokyo, where he and a Taiwanese scientist worked on special microbiology projects. He left the Army in 1968 with the rank of lieutenant colonel.

Arthur's ancestor had been a congregational missionary in Connecticut, but traveled around the nation. He settled in San Antonio during the 1840s and joined the Presbyterian church which had been founded by John McCullough, our church.

Even though Arthur's parents were members of First Presbyterian when he was born and he grew up in the church, no record of his baptism was found. So, when he came back to join the church in 1951, he was baptized, likely for the second time. (That Chinese-design furniture in the foyer on the third floor of the church's education building was a gift to the church from a member of the Newton family, to honor Arthur's parents).

In the 62 years since this last baptism, Arthur Newton has served God and his church well. He was a deacon and ran the church library for about eight years. He now is a member of KEYS and attends the spring and fall special Bible studies as a member of Ron Baker's men's small group. Arthur recalls that the first small group in which he was a member was chaired by George Sturch when George first came to the church.

Arthur is well known for his astute observations on life and his friendly demeanor. To what does he attribute his longevity? "I don't really know," he told us. "I didn't plan it. It just happened."

He does not offer a philosophy on life, just that he has been blessed in it. His Christian service is ample evidence that he lives a life exhibiting this blessing. Wryly, he recently observed during a discussion in his Bible study on sin, "At my age, there are no sins left."

Arthur is known for being a quite active citizen at 100 years old. He still attends public events. This past Fiesta week, he was observed having a good, and quite late, time at the ball for the queen of the Order of the Alamo, in which he is quite likely the oldest member.

His health? He is doing quite well, thank you, even though walking long distances now is a bit of a problem. Recently, the doctor told him he has a "little" heart problem. How little? he asked. "I can't really say how much," he doctor replied. "But, you have to remember that your heart is 99 years old."

And, Arthur is well known as the fellow who drives that late-model green Jaguar automobile often parked in the special parking lot behind the church. He became a fan of that luxury auto brand when he first saw one in a showroom in London. He has had four of them.

We just can't help but wonder if they have Jaguar automobiles in heaven. If they do, we can be assured that when Arthur Newton gets "elderly" and God calls him home, that he will be driving one of those Jaguars in paradise.
