

Make "Scents" of Life

I don't know about you, but I love this time of year. Spring has sprung and the next thing we know the summer sun will be stinging out yards. But what about the May flowers? Isn't that also what May is supposed to bring—the beauty of the flowers in full bloom? Isn't that why we say "April showers and May flowers?"

Well, sadly, there weren't many April showers this year, but I am not giving up on the May flowers! In fact, that is *precisely* what I want to encourage you to be—a May flower. Now, before you check out on this and think I am being a little too corny—hear me out. Flowers bring smiles to faces. Flowers add beauty to a room. Some flowers even provide a nice aroma. I know, I am way ahead of you; flowers also die—there, I said it. Now, focus, I have a point here.


But here is the warning: making "scents" does not always make sense!

Imagine the sweet smell of devotion; the lingering scent of humility and gratitude for life, hope and forgiveness.

The other day I read an interesting story about Jim Cymbala, the longtime pastor of Brooklyn Tabernacle Church—some would say one of the most influential churches in America. Jim tells this remarkable story: "About 20 years ago, I said something impromptu to the new members lined up across the front of the church. As we received them, the Holy Spirit prompted me to add, 'And now, I charge you that if you ever hear another member speak an unkind word of criticism or slander against anyone—myself, an usher, a choir member, or anyone else—that you stop that person in mid-sentence and say, "Excuse me-who hurt you? Who ignored you? Who slighted you? Was it Pastor Cymbala? Let's go to his office right now. He'll apologize to you, and then we'll pray together so God can restore the peace to this body. But we won't let you talk critically about people who aren't present to defend themselves."" (Denison Forum, March 21, 2013)

2013 Seek and You Shall Find Easter Celebration







Medical Mission Trip 2013

Most tourists visiting the well-known resort city of Cancún are likely to return home with memories of a tropical resort vacation with pristine white sandy beaches along the Carribbean coast of southern Mexico. However, First Presbyterian Church members who recently returned from that area traveled beyond the comfortable tourist areas, and into the daily life of real Mexican families who have a completely different perspective of "getting away from it all."

Located just 45 minutes from "the glistening city" of Cancún, the town of Leona Vicario did not have electricity until two years ago. Educational options are extremely limited. Medical care is bleak.

For many years, our church has partnered with the organization Yucatan Peninsula Mission (YPM) to meet physical and spiritual needs of this community in order to show the love of Jesus Christ. First Presbyterian member Danny Mathews has taken the initiative to make Jesus visible to the

community through building relationships of trust and respect while providing desperately needed medical supplies and care. The trip is so well-organized by Danny, as well as spiritually uplifting, that many of the team members demonstrate their dedication by returning year after year. In fact, FPC member Arthur Allison has gone at least 22 times!

First-time trip participant Leslie Little hesitated at the opportunity because she had no professional medical expertise and felt like she didn't have much to offer to the team. However, after some encouragement from Danny, as well as from First Presbyterian Church member Craig Bell and First Presbyterian Director of Missions Alyssa Payne, she recognized that God would find a way to use her own unique gifts to serve Him, and she decided to go for it.

Upon arrival in the village, Leslie was moved by the stark reality of abject physical poverty, but also felt God's presence in the community. "This trip was a reassurance about the faith of the Mexican people, especially the extremely poor," she said. "We take so much for granted in the United States, and we are really so very blessed."

Despite physical poverty, Leslie noticed the spiritual wealth of the local community as they served alongside each other in a health clinic. She noticed their heartfelt compassion as they organized appointments, described procedures, and explained medication. The FPC team reflected selfless acts of service as well, and through working together as the body of Christ, they were able to provide much-needed medical care to people in desperate need. Leslie was impressed and encouraged by the ways in which everyone supported each other and gave their best to work with a positive attitude and a heart for service.

On the last night of the trip, the locals who had worked so diligently alongside the FPC team offered a time of worship and communion. The Mexican women lifted their voices in a Spanish version of a very familiar song, singing "Eat this bread, drink this cup." It was an emotional gift for Leslie and the team and surely a sweet song for our Savior to hear believers from two very different parts of the world working together as one for the sake of the Gospel.

Returning home from such a spiritually refreshing week was difficult for Leslie and the team. There were so many patients with a diagnosis that would be considered treatable or even preventable in the U.S., but due to the complexities and limitations of the Mexican medical system combined with the struggles of poverty, there were some patients that they were simply unable to help. However, the local YPM team is

working hard to help those patients find the specialists they need. The team would appreciate your prayers that God would provide comfort and healing to these patients in His own way and timing.

Thanks be to God for our dedicated and caring First Pres members who live to make Jesus visible in Mexico!

Maybe it is because I was recovering from a life-changing event in my own life and felt I might be able to share my journey

of recovery with someone. Maybe I thought it would be interesting to be in the "first" of something. Or, maybe it was just a God-thing. (You know, when you do something for all the wrong reasons and then find out that God was directing you all along?)

But, what I do know is this: I have helped several people (Care Receivers) navigate their own personal issues, and I have been blessed in the process. I am a better listener because of my Stephen Ministry training. I have a compassion for people who are dealing with emotional times in their lives and I am stronger for having walked alongside them in their search for a new "normalcy." I always thought this ministry was about giving, and I found out that I "got" more than I "gave." And, I

know that every one of our Stephen Ministers would say the very same thing!

I was astounded by some of the responses we received last fall when we did a church-wide survey regarding the ministry. More than a few respondents made comments like "Well, I don't know anyone in our church who would need this kind of help, but if they did, I guess it would be good." Our church is full of people who are facing life-changing issues: the loss of a loved one, or a devastating diagnosis; a child who leaves home, or a child who returns home—for all the wrong reasons. Marriages are failing and families are being torn apart. Financial setbacks are occurring and jobs are scarce. The list goes on and on, and while some of the situations appear to be more serious than others, all these circumstances (and more) leave people feeling alone and lonely.

I don't know if you need someone to walk alongside you as you navigate new life situations or if, like me, you think you might have a gift or talent for listening and helping someone else. 

Goal 13:34 Partners with Malawi

Be ready. You never know when God will place in your path an opportunity that changes your life. Be expectant. God has a habit of using imperfect, ordinary people to do His work. And it's so much fun! Here's is one way it happened for us.

During an average Sunday in worship, our youngest son spotted a tall, dark-skinned man. The man was Ishmael Kelly Kumwenda. He had traveled to San Antonio from Malawi, Africa to gather information to bring back to his country. (Malawi happens to be located at the coordinates 13° South 34° East.) Lawson (our son) announced to us "He's my friend.

I need to go talk to him." So he did. We followed. A conversation turned into a ride home. That ride home turned into lunch, which led to relationship, which led to eye-opening knowledge that broke Lawson's father's heart. He asked: "Ishmael, please tell me something I can do for your village in Malawi." And Ishmael, without pause, said: "Our people would love a couple soccer jerseys." Done. One large email, one facebook post and one month later about 1000 jerseys made their way from the backs of American kids aged preschool through college, onto our front porch, into our family room. From there, they were sorted, packed and sent back with Ishmael to Malawi, Africa.

On March 2, 2013, 6,500 kids and adults gathered in a dirt field for the first Goal 13:34 jersey distribution and organized soccer tournament. A full set of jerseys was given to 8 different primary schools. It was the first time any had worn a jersey.* All thanks was given to our Lord Jesus for that day and a message of encouragement to stay in school was delivered to the children.** However, the biggest goal of that day was to show the children they are important, treasured and loved. After all, that is what John 13:34 is all about. Goal 13:34 is now an ongoing partnership between the US and Malawi. We continue to collect used soccer jerseys for distribution in Malawi. *In Malawi, soccer is the main venue for gathering. It is very much a part of life in Malawi. Official school games are played often barefoot. One team wears the single shirt they own, the other team removes their shirt to differentiate.

** One of the largest factors in Malawi (and Africa in general) fueling the cycle of poverty is school drop-out. To be clear, not high school dropout as we have in the U.S. Rather, elementary school dropout. Children leave school to help the family survive.

How Session Works

the church:

Treating One Another in Kindness By David Youngquist

Scripture is clear on how we should conduct ourselves over issues where church members are in disagreement. Actions which disrupt the peace and unity of the church are contrary to scripture and distract the church from building Christ's Kingdom on earth. As new church officers are elected it should be remembered that the actions of officers of the church should be an example of how to live peaceably with those of differing opinions. The Bible is very clear in numerous places about how to treat each other with kindness and these words should be our guide when disagreements arise. While the Session does not anticipate or demand agreement on all issues every Elder and Deacon is expected to conduct himself by the following scriptures when disagreements occur. The session believes these same scriptures apply to all members of

Let no corrupting talk come out of your mouths, but only such as is good for building up, as fits the occasion, that it may give grace to those who hear. And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, by whom you were sealed for the day of redemption. Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put away from you, along with all malice. Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you. (Ephesians 4:29-32)

If anyone says, "I love God," and hates his brother, he is a liar; for he who does not love his brother whom he has seen

cannot love God whom he has not seen. And this commandment we have from him: whoever loves God must also love his brother. (1 John 4-20-21)

If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. (Romans 12:18)

The Bible also speaks about how we should respond to those whose actions disrupt the peace and unity of the church.

Repay no one evil for evil, but give thought to do what is honorable in the sight of all. If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave it to the wrath of God, for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." To the contrary, "if your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink; for by so doing you will heap burning coals on his head." Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good. (Romans 12:17-21)

Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. (Colossians 3:12-14)

Finally, all of you, have unity of mind, sympathy, brotherly love, a tender heart, and a humble mind. Do not repay evil for evil or reviling for reviling, but on the contrary, bless, for to this you were called, that you may obtain a blessing. For "Whoever desires to love life and see good days, let him keep his tongue from evil and his lips from speaking deceit; let him turn away from evil and do good; let him seek peace and pursue it. For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous, and his ears are open to their prayer. But the face of the Lord is against those who do evil." (1 Peter 38-12)

But I say, do not resist an evil person! If someone slaps you on the right cheek, offer the other cheek also. (Matthew 5:39)

Following the lessons of scripture the Session of First Presbyterian Church will strive to seek peace and pursue it. We believe this is the correct way to conduct ourselves so that we can be a blessing and receive a blessing; by "seeking peace and pursuing it". By doing this we will be "living to make Jesus visible".

The History Corner

"But only one thing is needful" Luke 10:42-Scripture in Stained Glass

Look to your right as you enter the sanctuary and you will see the beautiful, one-hundred year- old stained glass window which depicts Mary in rapt attention as she sits at the feet of Jesus Christ. This masterpiece of glass art memorializes Laura Mitchell who died in 1908.

The village of Bethany was located on the eastern slope of the Mount of Olives on the road linking Jerusalem to Jericho. It was just over a mile and a half from Jerusalem so it would have been a convenient place for Jesus and His fellow Galileans to stay while visiting Jerusalem for a feast day or some other occasion.

Jesus had three friends in Bethany and He would occasionally stay at their home when He was in Judea. Sisters, Mary and Martha and their brother, Lazarus, lived together in a house which was probably owned by Martha. At least, Luke records that it was Martha who welcomed the Lord into her house (Luke 10:38).

While Martha was busy preparing food for her guests, her sister Mary sat at the Lord's feet listening to his teaching. Martha came to Jesus and said, "Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to do all the serving alone? Then tell her to come and help me."

But the Lord said to her, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and upset about so many things but only one thing is needed. Mary has discovered it and it will not be taken away from her."

Laura Presnall was born in 1839 in Bossier Parrish, Louisiana. Laura was fifteen years old when she moved with her family to San Antonio in 1854. Two years later, she married Hiram Mitchell who died in 1880. Laura was the mother of five children but only two survived her: daughters, Mrs. Gus Mauermann and Miss Lenore Mitchell.

Laura was baptized at First Presbyterian by profession of faith on January 8, 1870 and remained an active member of the Church until she died of heart failure on January 6, 1908. Services were held in her family home at 126 Garden St. (now S. St. Mary's) conducted by Rev. Arthur Gray Jones, pastor of First Presbyterian Church. She is interred in the Confederate Cemetery on East Commerce Street.

Counting on the Money Man



Some folks refer to James Melvin "Jim" Witten as the "money man." Jim Witten is far more than that. He is a blessing to First Presbyterian Church and a true man of God.

Jim, a man of small stature but of loving heart, has been the perpetual

treasurer of the church's KEYS (Keeping Everyone Young in Spirit), our program for senior adults, for many years.

Jim, who was asked to take on money-collecting operations for KEYS somewhere in the mid-1990s, took on the job in a permanent capacity and became the man upon whom everyone depended to keep the finances straight. Jim's presence at the money table for every KEYS function in his capacity to collect funds for luncheons and so-forth was a familiar scene to everyone. He was the fellow upon whom KEYS could count to make sure the correct money was collected. He was meticulous in his counting duties.

Now, declining health has forced Jim to step back from his church financial role. He suffers from pulmonary fibrosis.

Jim has left his long-time volunteer duty, but he has not left

the hearts and thoughts of so many friends.

Jim Witten is a native San Antonian, a son of our city's south side. He grew up in the Highland Park district and attended school there. He then was enrolled in Central Catholic High School, where he was a member of the ROTC. He continued his ROTC duties at the University of Texas at Austin, where he also was a fraternity member.

He was commissioned and served active duty in Germany and then as a member of both the Texas National Guard and Army Reserves.

He met a young lady named Char-An, the daughter of a military family, and they were married at the chapel at Fort Sam Houston. Jim took a job as a loan examiner for the state, retiring at the age of 62, about 20 years ago. The Wittens became members of First Presbyterian Church in 1965. One of their children, Eric, and his family also are members of the church.

Both Char-An and Jim have served the church and the Lord well. Jim worked with Habitat for Humanity in the early days, marshaled a program to deliver loaves of bread to new church members, was an usher team captain and is a deacon. It was for his devoted work in counting his blessings while counting KEYS money, however, that he is so well-known by so many grateful First Presbyterian members. In his humble way, he takes no credit for his service to God and man. He just believes the Lord has counted on him to do what he can for the kingdom.

Good job, Jim. See us when you can. We are counting on it.

Needless to say, Jae's performance was both outstanding and significant for several reasons. The "Rildia Bee O'Bryan Cliburn Pipe Organ" is one of the finest church organs in the country and is one of the largest pipe organs of a French tonal design in America. To give you some sense of scale, the Cliburn Organ is more than 3½ times larger than the organ in our sanctuary. The organ is enhanced by the beautiful Broadway Baptist Sanctuary, which boasts a three-to-five-second reverberation of the organ thanks to its high vaulted

ceiling and stone tiled floors. As the name of the organ suggests, its construction was underwritten by Van Cliburn in honor of his mother, Rildia Bee O'Bryan Cliburn.

For many years, Broadway Baptist has hosted a Lenten Concert Series, inviting some of the finest organists from across the country to participate as performers. While we have all come to expect musical greatness from Jae when he performs, Jae was truly "inspiring" to hear on an instrument that truly equals his vast ability and musical intellect!

Sadly, it was only a few weeks prior to Jae's recital that Broadway Baptist conducted a memorial service for Van Cliburn, a long-time member of the church. Van Cliburn was a strong supporter of the music ministry of Broadway Baptist Church. His death on February 27 marked the end of a life and career as an unequaled performer, musical ambassador, and founder of one of the world's finest piano competitions.

It is my hope that Jae will return to Broadway Baptist in the future to perform again on their outstanding pipe organ. In the mean time, we have posted a short excerpt of his March 25 performance on our church website (www.fpconline.org) for you to enjoy.

I know that I join you in offering a hearty congratulations to Jae for his outstanding representation of the music ministry of First Presbyterian Church in Fort Worth, Texas!

We hope excellent organ and choral music will persevere as it has for centuries—and that children and youth will know and appreciate the works of choral masters in worship."
