

Presbyterian Women and Local Missions have long supported Presbyterian Children's Homes and Services (PCHAS), and many of the children who are a part of the PCHAS family attend First Presbyterian Church. The entire congregation is warmly encouraged to come to this back-to-school barbecue for the food and the fun.

About PCHAS: Since its beginnings in 1903 as an orphanage in Dallas, Presbyterian Children's Homes and Services has been providing residential care and other services to children and families with no place else to turn. They serve children from birth to age 17 who have suffered from neglect, abuse and



abandonment, or children whose families are experiencing some type of crisis, such as the death of a parent, divorce, illness, violence, homelessness, parental drug/alcohol abuse and other issues that threaten family stability. Whether it's through one of the group homes, a foster home, the Child and Family Program, or the Advanced Education and Aftercare Program, they do all they can to help show the children in their care that they are beloved children of God. PCHAS has a group home in San Antonio that currently houses six boys and four girls, and has a child and family counselor working in the area, seeking to provide stability within the home and the family, to prevent the removal of children from their family unit. Transforming Our City Together

Why San Antonio Christian Dental Clinic Says "This Is My FPC"

This summer, San Antonio Christian Dental Clinic received a call from a woman at a corporate dental chain who asked if we could see a patient who needed twelve extractions. The worker told us Monica's insurance only covered three and that the corporate supervisors would not provide any care without compensation.

Normally, a patient with dental insurance would not qualify for services at our clinic, yet Monica was in such pain that she was unable to eat. The resulting malnutrition prevented her from reaching the healthy weight level she needed in order to proceed with treatment for multiple sclerosis. An executive decision was made and Monica was treated immediately.

Our staff juggled to squeeze in an appointment. Our dentist came in on an "off" day just to see Monica. Our First Pres volunteers processed paperwork even as Monica was in triage. The clinic was able to successfully provide Monica the extractions and dentures she needed.

Shortly afterward, Monica sent us a lovely thank you note, joined our prayer circle picture, and blessed us all. She then made a personal donation that we are certain was excessive for her situation. Monica told us the gift was the result of a calling from Christ.

As I write this story, Monica is sitting in the patient recovery area where everyone is greeting her by name. One of our docs stopped by to give her a hug. Another dental assistant offered coffee. Our Executive Director chatted for a bit and found that she is gaining weight, getting MS treatment, and grinning from ear to ear as she noted that her daughter is now receiving dental care.

One life: one world—all begun with seeds of love planted by members of First Presbyterian Church.

The San Antonio Christian Dental Clinic (SACDC), a Christian ministry founded in 1986 under the auspices of First Presbyterian Church, puts faith into action by providing free dental care for impoverished and homeless Bexar County adults who lack access to oral healthcare. The work of the clinic is truly God's work, relieving pain and restoring health for many adults who do not qualify for government programs and might otherwise go without care.

Our FPC church has been the backbone of SACDC since the clinic's birth under the leadership of Vicky Le Pere, Orvis Meador, and Louis Zbinden. Since then, our FPC ladies (and a few men) have led the clinic from two chairs and a single staff member to 12 chairs, four private operatories and a full-fledged team of over 16 personnel and contractors and over 250 volunteers.

SACDC is unique to Bexar County in that all services are provided at no cost to the patient. Prosthetics are provided at minimal cost, yet are sometimes free for patients meeting qualifications associated with donor-restricted support. While similar Bexar County agencies offer dental programs with sliding scale fees, the clinic relies on private support and boasts no taxpayer impact since it accepts no government funding.

Our FPC has helped us to offer a full range of dental services, and to offer clinic volunteers an outlet for personal service. As Haven for Hope partners, we are helping to foster personal responsibility while playing a key role in helping homeless adults toward independence and self-sufficiency; sometimes through recovery; and especially to employability.

In 2012, 2,941 unduplicated patients were treated over the course of 8,969 patient visits. One or more procedures were performed per visit for a total of 55,077 procedures with a retail value of \$2,880,848. The clinic hosts a tuition-free Registered Dental Assistant (RDA) training program to prepare disadvantaged young adults for employment.

With revenues based uniquely on private support and largely dependent on foundations and in-kind professional services, the SACDC funding model succeeded for many years. Although the move to Haven for Hope and the partnership with UTHSC Dental School have provided exciting opportunities for growth, 2012 presented a dip in the financial support that drives our mission.

Who responded to our first outcry during this challenge? Our FPC! With an immediate response from FPC direct patient care continued undiminished. As such, we are able to move forward to 2013, SACDC's goals include providing onsite dental care disadvantaged Bexar County adults.

Thank you FPC: the genesis of our family of faith and service at San Antonio Christian Dental Clinic!

Saying Goodbye to La Meseta and the Dominican Republic

This last trip to the DR was amazing. We all bonded so beautifully as a team (nine women and three men with an age span of 16 to mid 70s!) and we felt God's presence from the moment we gathered at the airport. Once there, we built latrines, did home visits, visited the AMO Christian learning program and held VBS at the Community Church. There are so many wonderful memories that I came home with, but one very special memory is of a grandmother I met on our first work day. I was on the a.m. latrine team, and we headed out walking to this house that was about a mile away. When we arrived, the woman of the house came out to greet us — this beautiful grandmother who I imagine was about 75 but looked much younger, with this beautiful skin,



white hair and a baby on her hip. After chatting with her for a while, we got on to our work but were noticing some really black clouds building up. We were just about through with the form for the foundation when the rains came. The house had a small covered porch and our sweet friend ushered us all over there. A little rain turned into a downpour and she insisted that we come inside her home. The living area was about 12'x6' and with the two overstuffed chairs, it was a tight squeeze! I was thankful to be out of the rain but was really thinking that surely God would make it stop so we could keep working and finish the latrine for this woman who really needed it!

It was then that I started visiting with my friend, the grandmother. She told me about her family and that she only had four grandchildren and that the other six or seven running around were cousins or neighbors that she took care of. I told her I was so sorry about the rain and that I was afraid we would have to come back the next day because everything was too wet! She looked at me with those beautiful bright eyes and a smile and said "Oh, no! This rain is a blessing from God! If it doesn't rain, our crops don't grow and we don't eat! There will be time for the latrine!" This was a perfect example of being more blessed than I could ever bless! I can still see her as if it were yesterday. Her face may fade in my memory, but I will carry her and the lessons she reminded me of in my heart forever. She was living God's agenda, not ours! She was living "Give us this day our daily bread" and that all things happen "in God's





I could tell you story after story – of special moments, sad moments, precious children and holding little babies. We were welcomed like royalty and loved so beautifully and

unconditionally and thanked profusely and joined them in their unreserved worship and praise! But in all that, we all received so much more than we could ever have given. My heart is so full of joy, love, hope and some sadness in leaving and some frustration that we can't do more. But then, I remember my friend who reminded me of her blessings and "in God's time!"



Imagine looking through a pair of glasses with red stripes on the lenses. The entire world would seem to be covered with red stripes, and a person may not be able to imagine that the red stripes could ever be removed and allow clear vision. *Our worldview, the ways in which we view the world, impacts EVERYTHING in our lives.*

Before a worldview of Biblical truth existed in La Meseta, Satan clutched onto families for generations and entrapped them into poverty through the worldviews of synchretism, Voudou mixed with Roman Catholocism, animism, the idea that all things both animate and inanimate have a soul and are spiritual, and fatalism that humans live in submission to an evitable fate.

These beliefs paralyzed the community and prevented them from taking responsibility for their actions and seeking to improve the world around them. As Food for the Hungry came into the village, they sought to change the old world-view of the residents, removing the red stripe and allowing them to see clearly, by the truth of the gospel.

Now, many residents have entered into relationship with Jesus Christ, there is a thriving church and children's ministry there, and the community knows how to improve sanitation and health by building their own latrines. God has transformed this village, and we are thankful that He has allowed us to be a part of that as we have witnessed this growth these last 10 years of taking trips there!



The Transformation of the Community of La Meseta

Food for the Hungry (FH)
responds to God's call to walk
with churches, leaders, and families in overcoming all forms of
human poverty.

Residents of La Meseta and FH join together to identify critical needs and to develop a long-term plan for sustainable, holistic community transformation.

FPC responds to God's call to make disciples of all nations by partnering with La Meseta, supporting and encouraging each other, learning how to live in healthy relationship with God.

FH employees work with the local church, school, government, community leaders, and families to identify and address spiritual and physical needs. FPC sends on average two mission teams per year to support specific goals.

FPC members begin to develop awareness of community needs and advocate in a variety of ways (examples: writing letters of encouragement, fundraisers selling Dominican coffee, hosting a "Hunger Banquet" and funding a community water well) FPC commits to faithful prayer and financial support of God's work through FH in the following areas:

community sponsorship, spiritual growth, training and leadership development, nutrition, church strengthening, health, sanitation, education, agricultural practices, and basic infrastructure.

Community begins to replace lies from Satan with worldview that reflects Biblical TRUTH, including the following:

God is real. God loves us. He created each of us for a unique purpose. Children are a gift from God, and we are all created in His image. Human life has value. God has chosen humans to be dominant over animals. Work is a blessing, not a curse. Ideas have consequences.

(note: these are just a few examples of Biblical worldview)

Testimonies from La Meseta


My name is Everluz Urbáez Rosario, FH Coordinator of Child Transformation for the Border Region of the Dominican Republic. When I began working in the community of La Meseta in 2004, I felt sad to go there because I

knew the habits of the community. Upon arrival, I would always see groups of children and teenagers hanging out on street corners playing betting games for money, getting high on drugs, and generally up to no good. This caused a lot of anxiety for me, and I worried that my own life was in danger.



I went to the school requesting to use a classroom for the initiation of a Christian education curriculum [introduced to the community by First Presbyterian Church] known as "AMO" (Apacienta Mis Ovejas). The teachers told me very bluntly, "Everluz, we feel sorry for you. You obviously don't understand that these are kids from La Meseta; they cannot control themselves, they behave terribly, and they don't obey anyone." I left my first session of AMO with a sore throat and a headache, but I didn't let myself get discouraged, because I was confident in my belief that God could do something within these children through AMO.

About a month later, it was clear that God was transforming the heart of the children. People who walked by the open windows of the classroom didn't even realize there were kids in there because they had been able to develop an appropriate atten-



After only one year of AMO, my two classes (around 90 total) accepted the Lord. They have become leaders within the congregation, with some leading Sunday School classes for the younger kids of the community and others preaching the gospel, all for the pur-

pose of winning more souls for Christ. There are also many parents of these children who have accepted Christ after seeing the lives of their children transformed through this program.







My name is Hilda Lima Roa, FH Child Development Worker from the Border Region of the Dominican Republic. Georgina, age 13, grew up with a worldview resulting from her environment. In Georgina's rural community near the border of Haiti, young girls were raised in dysfunctional families, completely immersed in poverty, witchcraft, disease, substance abuse, and gambling. Her parents and teachers called her disobedient. Her older brothers called her violent. Even the neighbors complained about her poor behavior. What possible hope exists? Does God know her? Does He care about her life? Is there anyone out there who will live to make Jesus visible in her life?

After noticing the dramatic positive changes in other neighborhood kids, Georgina's parents decided to enroll their daughter in FH's youth programs. Georgina began to understand through studying the Bible that her disrespectful actions were not in line with God's desires for her life. She began to pray and to trust in God. She returned home from each meeting with "Blessing Cards" which listed her specific prayer requests with a note asking her parents to pray for her as well. She gave them to her mother, who quickly dismissed the power of prayer and casually tossed the cards aside.

One day, a medical crisis shocked the family and Georgina's distraught mother nearly followed the advice of her neighbors to seek a cure from Voudou witches. Then she remembered her daughter's Blessing Cards. She reflected upon how much Georgina's life had transformed through prayer, how she developed hope and faith in the one true God and firmly trusted in Him, rather than in rituals of witchcraft. Taking a first step of faith, Georgina's mother began to pray. In God's own perfect timing, He was able to use Georgina's faith developed during an after-school program to eventually bring her entire family into a

relationship with Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior.



Georgina and her family are grateful to God for the changes that he has brought to the community through FH working in partnership with a group of believers in San Antonio, Texas. She now has hopes and dreams: "When I grow up, I would like to be a teacher so that other children can be transformed like me."

Making Jesus Visible in Malawi, Africa



Our journey with La Meseta has reached a conclusion. *However, this is not the end of us making Jesus visible around the world!* Our next partnership will begin a new chapter in Africa, in the village of Mutendere, Malawi.

On Palm Sunday of 2013, we joined as a community of believers to faithfully commit to sponsoring over 250 children. At the time, it was announced that there may be the possibility of visiting sponsored children in the future. In less than six months, God placed a

desire within the hearts of many congregation members to become a new group of witnesses to God's work of transformation and redemption around the world. The community of Mutendere has invited us to visit at the end of October 2013, and with joy we will send twelve team members into our next exciting adventure of faith, to begin a new partnership with a new group of friends. Our hope is that both the community of Mutendere and the community of FPC will be forever changed, transformed, and blessed by our relationship with one another.

Names Matter—Building Relationships Like Jesus

One of the final classes I had to take in business school was referred to in hushed tones as "Integrative." It was a challenging course designed to pull together many concepts we had previously studied and prepare us for success in the business world. On the first day the professor strolled in, surveyed the room, and began to call roll. There was not a note in his hand – he had already learned our names. As he called them one by one he studied our faces. From that day forward he knew all fifty of us on sight! You can imagine the kind of respect he earned from students in those first few moments. Lesson one in "Integrative" was unmistakable and powerful: *Names matter; making the effort to learn them and use them would be important to our success in business*.

Jesus understands the importance of knowing people – not just their names, but also something about them. In John 1:47–51, Nathanael is eager to follow Jesus because Jesus clearly demonstrates that he already knows and cares for Nathanael the instant they first meet. Likewise, Jesus calls to the tax collector Zaccheus by name and encourages him to come down from the tree. Zaccheus responds by welcoming Jesus into his home for dinner (Luke 19:1–6). The Samaritan woman at the well is astounded to discover that Jesus knows her story. When Jesus reveals himself to her as Messiah, she runs back to her village to spread the word about him (John 4:7–30). Jesus describes how a shepherd "calls his own sheep by name and leads them out." He then tells us "I am the good shepherd. I know my own and they know me." (John 10:3, 14). Jesus' invi-

tation to follow him is much more compelling because he knows us intimately and yet loves us faithfully.

Just as my professor taught and Jesus demonstrates, making the effort to learn names and use them will be important to our success in making Jesus visible as a community of faith. I want to challenge us to be intentional about getting to know one another by name. I confess that I struggle with this, but I believe that I am not alone. The good news is that greeting someone by name is a skill that can be learned. It requires discipline, practice, and sometimes humility! Here are some ways we can begin:

Wear your FPC nametag whenever you attend a church function. If you don't have one or need an extra, visit the church reception desk or stop by the "Connecting" booth on Kick-off Sunday to purchase one. (\$4 normally, \$3 Kick-off Sunday)

Introduce yourself to people. Do it more than once if you have to and don't feel embarrassed or surprised when they tell you they have been coming to church for years!

Introduce people you know to one another. You will be surprised by how often people who should know one another do not. Facilitate new friendships!

Names matter. Learning names is the first step toward building more meaningful relationships as brothers and sisters in Christ and, even better, making Jesus visible in our midst!

How to Help Elementary Children through the Snack Pak 4Kids Program

Many children go home to empty spaces, and have no one to feed them a meal. Others may have parents that want to feed their children, but cannot afford to buy food.

The Snack Pak 4Kids program sends food home on the weekend to kids who regularly arrive "food-deprived" on Monday mornings at school. We are partnering with other local churches to make Jesus visible and reduce hunger right here in San Antonio.

A Message from Pam Colbert

Parent and Volunteer at Cambridge Elementary School

For dozens of children in Alamo Heights ISD, the meals they eat at school will be the only ones they eat all day. This carries into the weekend where these children often go without adequate food and nutrition until they eat a "free" breakfast back at school on Monday. This heart-breaking problem is labeled "food insecurity" and like you, I was shaken to find that it exists right here in my own backyard.

My name is Pam Colbert and I am a parent and volunteer at Cambridge Elementary. I am also the coordinator for the "Cambridge Cares: Snack Paks 4 Kids" program. This program is designed to address the desperate need of a small group of Cambridge students and ensure that they do not have to endure being "food-insecure." Like all volunteer programs, "Cambridge Cares: Snack Paks 4 Kids" cannot succeed in helping these children without the help and assistance of people like you. There are two ways in which you may help make a difference.

First, I am asking for volunteers to donate the gift of their personal time to aid these children. It will only require about an hour of your time once a month, or once a week as outlined below in the three phases of "Snack Paks":



- 1. First, volunteers are needed to unpack donated food from boxes and build the "Snack Paks" one Monday a month (approximately one hour).
- 2. Second, volunteers will pack the "Snack Paks" into plastic bags the Wednesday of the same week (approximately one hour).
- Finally, volunteers will discreetly place the Snack Paks into the classrooms of the children in need, while the students are attending music or PE out of the classroom. This will happen every Friday and should only take about an hour.

The second way you may make a difference is through donations of food. Specifically, we need 16-oz. jars of creamy peanut butter for once a month distribution to those families in need. These jars of peanut butter will augment the "Snack Paks" of donated food that will be sent home with the children each week on Fridays.

Volunteer sign-up sheets will be available on your church websites with a link to the program, volunteerspot.com. This website will help us organize and manage volunteers and donations from the wonderful people of Grace Fellowship Church, First Presbyterian, Kingdom Of Life House, and Alamo Heights United Methodist Church. These four wonderful communities are the first to offer their support to the children in need of this program.

On behalf of those involved, I personally thank you in advance for whatever you may offer to give. Your kindness and compassion will certainly make a difference in the quality of life for these students in need and will absolutely enrich the classrooms and the communities in which we live.

When I joined the Stephen Ministry class five years ago, I wanted to become more active in First Presbyterian and give something back. Little did I know that I would be the receiver of more than I could imagine giving to others.

I was one of the "fixers" in life, always ready with advice and trying to fix things for others—just the opposite of what a Stephen Minister is sup-

posed to do. As a Stephen Minister, I've learned that God is the true healer and all healing comes from Him.

The Stephen Minister training program has been called "the best 50 hours of training you'll ever experience" and I agree with that. It is conducted by Stephen Leaders and other Ministers to help us learn how to provide one-to-one Christian care to people going through difficult times. A bonus of the training is the friendship of the wonderful people you meet in your classes.

My role as a Stephen Minister is to be there for my care receiver, to listen, to pray and to be someone safe she can talk

to. I love my weekly visits, where we talk and pray. It was always difficult for me to "improvise" a prayer, but with the grace of God, it has become a welcome part of each visit. Our care receivers all have different problems and concerns, but each has a need for the comfort of God.

When people reach out to our leadership team and request a Stephen Minister, they begin the wonderful cycle of giving and receiving the love of God through this program.

Stephen Ministry is a confidential ministry that provides loving care for those in need of someone to listen to their needs, matching women with women and men with men on a one-on-one basis. Stephen Ministers never divulge the names of their care receivers.

That passage seems appropriate to our San Antonio summers, with 100 degree days and not much rain. But even if we have not had any rain in a while, we always have much to be thankful for.



NAMI Family Course Begins Sept 10

Helping Families Deal with Mental Illness

Over the past three years, over 100 families have attended the National Association of Mental Illness (NAMI) Family-to-Family classes hosted by FPC. During that time people trying to learn more about mental illness and how to help a loved one dealing with mental illness have come from throughout Bexar County and surrounding communities. They have travelled from as far away as Flatonia, Beeville, Devine and other cities and towns near San Antonio, travelling up to 1½ hours each way once a week for the 2½ hour class taught over 12 weeks.

The Family-to-Family class covers the following serious mental illnesses: Major Depression; Bipolar Disorder; Schizophrenia; Schizoaffective Disorder; Borderline Personality Disorder; Panic Disorder and Obsessive Compulsive Disorder; Post Traumatic Distress Disorder; Co-occurring Brain Disorder and Addictive Disorder.

Family members learn about the illnesses of the brain, their treatment and coping skills including: Up-to-date information about medications, side effects and strategies for medication adherence; Current research related to the biology of brain disorders and the evidence based, most effective treatments to promote recovery; Gaining empathy by understanding the subjective, lived experience of a person with mental illness; Learning in special workshops for problem solving, listening, and communication techniques; Acquiring strategies for handling crisis and relapse; Focusing on care for the caregiver and Coping with worry, stress, and emotional overload.

So why do people take this much time to attend a class over a three month period? One class participant shares her views with us as we prepare to begin another class on Sept. 10.

First Press: What first brought you to the Family-to-Family class at First Presbyterian Church?

Class Member: I was referred by my cousin who is a researcher at the UTHSC in schizophrenia. She knew I was struggling to help my family and knew about the classes at FPC.

First Press: Tell us about your family situation.

Member: I had two parents who I knew dealt with mental illness. My father was diagnosed with schizophrenia and spent time in a VA hospital being treated while I was growing up. My mother suffered from deep depression. Then when I began my own family I saw the same signs of schizophrenia in my daughter as she entered her teen years. I also have another daughter who suffers from serious depression.

First Press: How did your family deal with mental illness?

Member: As a child I prayed for my parents. I didn't know how to separate the illness from the person. As a parent I still didn't know how to handle it. I would ask myself, "Why my kids? What can I do to help them?" Other family members told us to get help and there was no help and I didn't know what to do.

First Press: How did other family members react during the time you were trying to get help for your daughters?

Member: They judged me as an unfit parent. I saw how mental illness affects the whole family...the aunts, uncles, cousins, siblings and grandparents. It tears families apart at the same time that you need more support than you can imagine.

First Press: What did you learn from the Family-to-Family class that helped you help your family?

Member: I finally understood that mental illness is a brain disorder. I thought back about my dad and saw how he had raised our family, provided for us and loved us in spite of his own mental illness. For the first time I was able to separate the mental illness from the person. We are not our illness any more than a person with a physical disability is his illness. Taking the Family-to-Family class saved my family! With my guilt taken away I got my life back and I saw how to help my family. The class gave me knowledge, understanding, resources, tools and hope I needed. I began to see how I could help my daughters manage their illness.

First Press: Who would you recommend taking the Family to Family class at FPC?

Member: Anyone who wants to learn about and understand mental illness. In fact, everyone can benefit but especially families dealing with mental illness. But most of us know of a friend, a neighbor or a relative that is living with mental illness, exhibiting thoughts and behaviors we do not understand. Everywhere I turn I encounter someone with a mental illness in their immediate circle of friends, family and acquaintances who needs our understanding and our love.

First Press: Anything else you'd like to add?

Member: Being in a class with other families dealing with mental illness helped give me the boldness to be able to speak up and encourage other people to get help. This class changed my life and saved my family. It can help other families too.

Postscript: Our class member has now been trained to teach the NAMI Family-to-Family class and will begin teaching this fall at Oak Hills Church. Her family life has a new order about it and her daughters are better managing their own mental illness. Her faith in God is stronger than ever and her faith that God works through all circumstances is at the center of her life. Life's circumstances are just as challenging, but she has a joy about her life and helping others. She is living to make Jesus visible to others.




