Pastor's Pondering

Looking Up for Lent

The month of March is upon us and with it comes the beginning of the Lenten Season. In fact, March 5 (Ash Wednesday) will mark the beginning of the 40-day period of repentance and renewal in preparation for the celebration of Easter.

Over the years many Christians have thought of Lent as a time to "give up" something. Some choose to give up chocolate, which I can't figure out. Why not give up something like beets? Others give up soft drinks or alcohol or various other things. The idea behind it is that in giving something up—we will be experiencing a taste of Jesus' suffering. But also, perhaps we will take the time to focus on the significance of Christ's Passion as well as the reality of His sacrificial death and life giving resurrection.

This Lenten Season I would like to suggest that rather than "giving up" we instead "look up." You see, each of us have experienced hard times, we have made mistakes, we have found ourselves in the midst of having more questions than answers, we have lamented in wonder if we would ever be able to make it through a particularly difficult situation. All of those situations in our lives have a way of leading us to a place of "giving up." But instead, what if we "looked up" from our pit of despair to our hope in Jesus Christ? Imagine choosing to "look up" rather than "giving up." Imagine how that could be transformational for our lives.

During this Lenten Season we will explore Biblical examples of how real people were able to get through real problems—by looking up. The series will be called "You'll Get Through This." A series that was inspired by a book written by Max Lucado entitled You'll Get Through This. In fact, I want to encourage you to purchase a copy of the book and read it during this Lenten Season. We will be addressing portions of the book throughout the sermon series as well as in our small groups. More importantly, I believe we all need to be reminded of the very presence of hope in the midst of troubled and turbulent times.



A Letter from our FPC Commissioned Missionary, Beth Allen

Twenty years ago, in July 1994, First Presbyterian Church sent me off to Phoenix, Arizona for pre-field training with Food for the Hungry (FH). What a journey it's been!

There have been many milestones where I leaned on FPC for counsel, support and healing. You were there when I sold my worldly goods in May 1995, and left to serve with FH in Bolivia. You were there when I came back to San Antonio, tired and sick, in August 1999; you helped me heal. You gave me office space at the church so I didn't spend my

days alone, working from my spare bedroom, as a telecommuting staffer with FH's relief operations.

You listened with your whole hearts when I told about places like Congo, the Balkans and Iraq, where FH staff were serving in the midst of war and disaster. The listening helped me see that what I did was an important part of the operation, even if I wasn't dodging bullets like a field staff person.

And you helped me transition again, in 2005, when I accepted a post at FH's Phoenix office.

It hasn't mattered so much what I was doing every day. You just loved me and supported me. That's been so helpful, during those times when I wondered if being in ministry was worth it.

These days I'm helping grow FH's communications capacity. My days are filled with gathering the stories, photos and video FH needs to communicate with our supporters, and raise funds. I talk daily with FH staff worldwide, sometimes in Spanish rather than English, but mostly slowly so we understand each other, and mostly on Skype. I work with a team to manage our photo and video library. I interact with our volunteers and interns, many of them just out of college and trying to find their way in the world. It's a rich experience.

The year has been harder than most, with substantial restructuring of our department within FH. About a month ago I would have said, "I can see the light at the end of the tunnel." Now, I'm out of the tunnel. I'll tell you more about that when I visit in March.

And I had my first experience visiting a disaster zone immediately after the disaster, when I went to the Philippines in November to gather media resource after Typhoon Haiyan. I've been to disaster zones before but usually several months after the onset of the problem. It was sad and exhilarating at the same time. Again, I'll tell you more about that when I see you!

Thanks again for being there, by my side, taking care of my physically, spiritually and emotionally for nearly two decades.

Join God's Mission in Malawi Help Fight Poverty and Injustice in October

First Presbyterian Church San Antonio has partnered with World Vision in 2013 to sponsor more than 250 kids in the village of Mutendere, Malawi. You are invited to meet these children and to witness how FPC's ongoing partnership with World Vision is helping the community discover their full potential as they tackle the causes of poverty and injustice.



Our first team from this congregation will travel to Malawi in April so you will hear a report from that team at the 1st Wednesday @ 1st Pres program May 7 (dinner at 5:30 p.m. in Westminster Hall; presentation at 6:30 p.m. in Covenant Hall; contact Nancy Berger at 210-226-0215 for details).







And here is some exciting news for you: registration is NOW OPEN for applicants who would like to be considered for a Vision Trip to Mutendere, Malawi October 4-14, 2014. Due to our limit of 12 travelers and a very high interest level in this trip, all applications will be submitted to the Global Missions Committee to ensure a fair selection process. We will begin conducting interviews to ensure we have a well-rounded group. The cost of the trip is about \$4,300. About half the cost of the trip is being covered by the church through the Global Missions Committee.



We then ask participants to solicit prayer and financial support from inside and outside the church to raise the balance of about \$2,000 per participant. Partial scholarships will also be available from the church if needed, so that everyone who feels called is able to participate!

What happens to the walls we build during Project 240?

If you have participated in our annual tradition of building a house during our event called "Project 240", you may have noticed that we only build the wooden framework. Obviously, these houses are not move-in ready yet! So what happens next? Nothing, without wonderful volunteers like YOU from around the city. At the end of the day after our Project 240 event, Habitat for Humanity loads up the frames we have constructed onto a truck and delivers them to a construction site of empty house lots.

Would you be able to volunteer on a Friday or Saturday to help us finish putting the house together?

We have a long history at FPC of working in cooperation with fellow believers from other Presbyterian churches in San Antonio in order to provide decent, affordable housing for families in need. Every year, we combine our skills and our enthusiasm for serving God in a tradition known as the "Presbyterian Cluster House" beginning this year on March 7th.

Members from Presbyterian churches from around the city (ages 14+) share an assigned Habitat neighborhood construction site. We begin with the wooden wall frames, and each church takes turns providing volunteers to add elements such as drywall, painting, planting trees, etc. Habitat teaches us what to do—no prior experience required! Tools, materials, and even lunch are also provided.

Through our collaboration with our Presbyterian brothers and sisters in Christ, we can easily complete one brand new house for a family in need, within only a few months! Isn't it amazing what we can accomplish when working together for God's glory?

Moments to Hold Close Sterling By Manny Rodriguez




Silver is such an amazing property. A great conductor of electricity used for fine jewelry, and a precious metal of great economic value.

Music Ministry

Mary Jean Rogers Memorial Concert Set for March 30

Our first major musical offering of 2014 is made possible through the Mary Jean Rogers Choral Endowment of First Presbyterian Church and each year honors the memory of Mary Jean Rogers, the mother of our own Jean Rogers Winchell, and their shared love of the church and great choral music. The 2014 Concert will be at 4:00 p.m. Sunday, March 30, 2014, in the Sanctuary. The Sanctuary Choir will perform Franz Schubert's Mass in G and Ola Gielo's Sunrise Mass. The choir will be accompanied by organ and an expanded string orchestra comprised of many San Antonio Symphony members. The one-hour program will offer a familiar work, as well as introduce a stunning new work to the San Antonio community.

FPC's Sanctuary Choir sang the Schubert Mass in concert eight years ago, and we've had occasional queries as to when we would present it again. Schubert was invited to compose a mass for the parish church of Lichtental, also known as the family's house of worship and often called Schubert-kirche (Schubert church). Schubert received an invitation to compose the mass in May 1814, and the premiere was offered on September 25, 1814. The premiere featured an estimated 62 performers including Schubert's brother, Ferdinand, who played the organ, and Schubert conducted. Major names were a part of the production and the music, and Schubert's teacher, Antonio Salieri, is said to have embraced his student with the words "der mir noch viele Ehre machen wird," which translates to "You will bring me yet more honor."

Contrasting the Schubert is Ola Gjeilo's Sunrise Mass, probably one of the more demanding works we have undertaken. The choir is divided into two choruses, each featuring soprano, alto, tenor and bass voices, each overlapping the other in waves of sound. Gjeilo notes that "I use

metaphor for human development from child to adult, or as a spiritual journey. I always want there to be a positive evolution in artistic expressions; to move everything forward, to transcend conflict and dissonance, by going through it, not avoiding it. Ideally, it has the capacity to help bring us deeper into ourselves rather than the other way. I really do think that's the main point of art, and I hope with all my heart that a sliver of that sentiment comes out in this piece, somehow."

 - Approved the 2013 Annual Church Statistical Report with corrections to Adult Ed.
 - Approved the 2014 Per Capita amount of \$14,742 that will be sent through Mission Presbytery to the General Assembly.
 - John Seiders shared letter he received regarding concerns related to parking for mobility-challenged members as well as people in need who pass by the church and through the parking lot and the challenges that raises. A task group has been appointed by Janet Slayden to address these issues and return recommendations to the Session.


