

#### **Pastor's Pondering**

#### Remember in November

"Remember the Alamo!"

My hunch is, you have heard that battle cry before—in fact, perhaps you have even said it yourself.

Hearing that statement again today, does it cause you to remember the 189 brave men who took refuge in the Alamo as they stood against Santa Anna's army—for 13 long

days valiantly fighting to the last man. Perhaps you remember that this same battle cry proved to be a source of strength for Sam Houston and his army as they engaged Santa Anna in the Battle of San Jacinto. Under the cries of "Remember the Alamo" Santa Anna's army was defeated. There is something about remembering that encourages us and provides us the courage to carry on in the battle.

As followers of Jesus Christ, I think it is important that we "Remember the Lord." I know that may seem like an obvious battle cry for a pastor to suggest, but I sincerely mean it. We are not in a battle for independence, but instead we are in a battle for dependence. We continue to struggle with how to truly depend on the Lord for our strength, courage, and provision.

Over and over again in the Bible we are told to "Remember." Hebrews 2:1 says, "We must pay more careful attention, therefore, to what we have heard, so that we do not drift way." Remember! Exodus 14:13-14 says: "Moses answered the people, 'Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the Lord will bring you today. The Egyptians you see today you will never see again. The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still." Remember!

I am absolutely convinced we need to "remember" more. Therefore, I would like to challenge you to "Remember in November." I want to encourage you to spend some time each day in November, remembering the promises of the Lord in and over your life. Remember that He has a plan for your life. Remember to be still and know that He is God. Remember that He gave His life for your redemption. Remember that He is not finished with you yet.

But also, remember the blessings He has poured into your life; family, friends, your church family, the very breath you are breathing at this moment. Remember when you learned to ride a bike and how empowered you felt. Remember the first touchdown pass you caught (that is not a memory I have). Remember the long walk on the beach, or the sunset in the mountains. Remember, remember, remember.

The other day I ran across a quote from Archbishop Oscar Romero, a quote that I think encourages us to step back, every  $\,$ 

now and then, and take a long view.

"The kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision. We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work. Nothing we do is complete, which is a way of saying that the kingdom always lies beyond us. No statement says all that could be said. No prayer fully expresses our faith. No confession brings perfection. No pastoral visit brings wholeness. No program accomplishes the church's mission. No set of goals and objectives includes everything.

This is what we are about. We plant the seeds that one day will grow. We water seeds already planted, knowing that they hold future promise. We lay foundations that will need further development. We provide yeast that produces far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something, and to do it very well. It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest. We may never see the end results, but tat is the difference between the Master Builder and the worker.

We are the workers, not Master Builders; ministers, not Messiahs. We are prophets of a future not our own. AMEN."

## Remembering

Veterans Day (November 11) will soon be with us. Originally it was called Armistice Day because on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, World War One ended. It is now called Veterans Day to honor all who have served in our Armed Forces for the defense of freedom in all wars This is a day of remembrance.

Memorial Day has past, as well as June 6th and July 4th. These are also days of remembrance. In October of last year, Mary Ann and I visited Normandy, France, and in particular the D-Day landing beaches. We visited the American military cemetery and also the German military cemetery. The rows of white crosses and Stars of David will be etched in my memory forever. The German cemetery had only flat grave markers but there were many crosses on view around the cemetery. There were no Stars of David of course. I could not escape the thought that on this battlefield, which might be the greatest accomplishment in military history, Christians were trying to kill each other. I have a family connection with this battle. My aunt was an Army nurse who landed at Utah Beach on D-day plus three, to set up one of the first field hospitals in Normandy.

After this visit, we went to the Holocaust museum in Caen, France. It was primarily about the imprisonment and execu-

tion of French Jews. However it was a graphic depiction of "man's inhumanity to man".

We later visited the village of St Mere Eglise. This was the place where many U.S paratroopers landed (in error) in the early morning hours of June 6, 1944. As depicted in the film "The Longest Day" Pvt. John Steele (played by Red Buttons) of the 82nd Airborne Division landed on the roof of the church and his parachute caught on one of the steeples. He hung there for hours and watched as the Germans killed his fellow paratroopers. When he was finally liberated and brought down from the steeple, he had lost his hearing for hours from the constant ringing of the church bells. I walked through the church and saw two beautiful stained glass windows depicting the paratrooper landings. I also noticed a tract rack and picked up a couple to read. One had some of the beautiful traditional prayers of worship in many Christian churches. The other was a list of Bible verses with a theme of PEACE. A few emphasized reconciliation of nations but most emphasized the peace that passes all understanding when we accept Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior. I have quoted some of them here.

When a man's ways please the Lord, he makes even his enemies to be at peace with him. (Prov 16:1)

You keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on you, because he trusts in you. (Isaiah 26:12)

Peace I leave with you: my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid. (John 14:27)

And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. (Phil 4:7)

Let the peace of Christ rule in hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful. (Col 3:15)

Now may the Lord of peace himself give you peace at all times in every way. (2 Thes 3:16)


If you are responsible for assisting a family member, loved one, or friend with meeting the demands of a chronic illness or disability.

## Deacon's Home Visitation Ministry

For many reasons, some members of our First Presbyterian Church congregation are not able to attend worship services or other church activities like they once did. Some are home-bound due to a long-term chronic illness or to a short-term health issue. Some are undergoing chemotherapy or recovering from an accident. Some have mobility issues or just find it harder to get up and out. Some have moved to an assisted living or a nurs-



ing facility. Whatever the circumstances they are still a part of our church family and we do not want them to become "out of sight, out of mind." For this reason Deacons reach out to these special members through the Home Visitation Ministry.

Home Visitation does not necessarily mean that a Deacon will always visit a person at their residence. Some members may not feel up to, or want, a face-to-face visit. They would, however, like to know that their church still cares about them. Often Deacons check in with "at-home" members using brief phone call, written notes, or even email. The purpose is to let the member know that they are being thought about and prayed for. It also gives the member an opportunity to share

any requests or prayer concerns that they may have.

As part of the Home Visitation Ministry, Deacons can also arrange for Communion to be brought to at home members on a quarterly basis if the member so desires. In addition Deacons bring seasonal flowers to at home members at Christmas and Easter.

Generally each Deacon is assigned an "at-home"

member with whom they "touch base" at least once a month. Sometimes these assignments last only a few months while others may last for several years. Most Deacons agree that the relationships formed with their "at-home" members are one of the most rewarding aspects of being a Deacon.



We were motivated to share the blessings of our small group experience (well, at least to try—the bar was set pretty high!) with others. It was a "Pay-It-Forward" commitment.

In Hebrews 10:22-25a, Paul calls on the believers to persevere in their faith:

Let us draw near to God with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled to cleanse us from a guilty conscience and having our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. And let us con-

sider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another...

Our group began over a year ago and God has blessed us in many ways through our fellowship and study. We have grown nearer to God, been held to accountability, experienced tears of thankfulness and joy as well as pain and sadness, and gained clear insights into the faith of our group members. As a result of our study, insights and faith and been called to serve group members as well as others outside the group. As a result, we have grown deeper friendships. The camaraderie of all these attendees was nothing short of spectacular, both at the mansion and as the group toured the Straus quarters and the capitol itself, including the House chamber. The lively discussions continued at lunch at the historic Green Pastures restaurant in artistically trendy south Austin.
