Pastor's Pondering Identity Theff

In recent months perhaps you have seen the news surrounding Target and how "cyber criminals" have hijacked credit card and bank information belonging to 40 million Target customers. In 2012, 166.6 million people fell victim to identity theft, amounting to financial losses of almost 25 billion. In terms of the latest situation with Target, early estimates are this could end up costing Target \$1 billion.

Identity theft: a form of stealing someone's identity in which someone pretends to be someone else by assuming that person's identity. In most cases, when we speak of identity theft, it carries negative connotations.

However, what if we were to view identity theft from a different perspective? What if identity theft was a form of receiving someone's identity in which you pretend to be someone else by assuming that person's identity? Could it be that "identity theft" may actually empower us?

There are many verses that speak to out "new identity" in Jesus. Such as:

"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!" (2 Corinthians 5:17)

"We are therefore Christ's ambassadors; as though God were making his appeal through us" (2 Corinthians 5:20).

"God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God"
(2 Corinthians 5:21).

"Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God—this is your spiritual act of worship. Do not conform any longer to the patter on this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will" (Romans 12: 1-2).

"He must become greater; I must become less" (John 3: 30).

Here at First our vision statement is: "Living to Make Jesus Visible." If you think about it, the only way we can truly do this is to allow Christ to be our identity by allowing Him to "steal" all of us. Imagine if, in all areas of our lives, we imitated Christ!

I recently read this interesting statement: "If you want to identify me, ask me not where I live, or what I like to eat, or how I comb my hair, but ask me what I think I am living for, in detail, and ask me what I think is keeping me from living fully for the thing I want to live for. Between these two answers you can determine the identity of any person" (Thomas Merton).

Perhaps God knew the something of the positive impact "identity theft" could have on the world. Perhaps that is why He sent His Son. Perhaps it would be wise for us to embrace a positive connotation of "identity theft."

Keep smilin' and keep lovin'-you are a child of God!

But also, we will wrestle with how the "solas" can and should remain foundations for our faith as we continue to strive to live to make Jesus visible.



NAMI Family-to-Family Class

The NAMI (National Alliance for Mental Illness) Family-to-Family Education Program is a free 12-week course for family caregivers of individuals with mental illnesses. The course is taught by trained family members. All instruction and course materials are free for class participants.

The *Family-to-Family* curriculum focuses on schizophrenia, bipolar disorder (manic depression), clinical depression, panic disorder and obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD).

The course discusses the clinical treatment of these illnesses and teaches the knowledge and skills that family members need to cope more effectively.

Family-to-Family Course Topics include:

- 1. Family responses to the trauma of mental illness.
- 2. Schizophrenia, major depression, and mania: DIagnosis and dealing with critical periods.
- 3. Depression and Bipolar subtypes; Panic disorder; Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD); Borderline Personality Disorder; Co-occurring brain and addictive disorders.
- 4. The biology of the brain: emerging scientific discoveries.
- 5. Problem solving workshop
- 6. Medication review
- 7. Understanding the inner experience of having a mental illness.
- 8. Communication skills workshop.
- 9. Self-care, relative group testimony.
- 10. Rehabilitation, services available.
- 11. Advocacy, fighting stigma.
- 12. Celebration and certification ceremony.

NAMI Peer-to-Peer Class

Peer-to-Peer is a unique, experiential learning program for people with any serious mental illness who are interested in establishing and maintaining their wellness and recovery. Please call the office to register for the next class!

The course was written by Kathryn Cohan McNulty, a person with a psychiatric disability who is also a former provider and manager in the mental health field and a long-time mutual support group member and facilitator.

An advisory board comprised of NAMI consumer members, in consultation with Joyce Burland, Ph.D., author of the successful NAMI Family-to-Family Education program, helped guide the curriculum's development.

Since 2005, NAMI's Peer-to-Peer Recovery Program has been supported by AstraZeneca.

What does the course include?

Peer-to-Peer consists of nine two-hour units and is taught by a team of three trained "Mentors" who are personally experienced at living well with mental illness.

Mentors are trained in weekend-long training sessions, supplied with teaching manuals, and are paid a stipend for each course they teach.

Participants come away from the course with:

- A binder of hand-out materials, as well as many other tangible resources
- An advance directive
- A "relapse prevention plan" to help identify tell-tale feelings, thoughts, behavior, or events that may warn of impending relapse and to organize for intervention
- Mindfulness exercises to help focus and calm thinking
- And survival skills for working with providers and the general public.

An Anonymous Reflection on Receiving Care



In early summer of 2012, I realized that I was experiencing the onset of early grief and financial concerns for my family. One of my family members was losing the capability to thrive on our green earth! At the time, I had no significant other to share my thoughts and sadness. I knew that I was not about to use my friends as a grief counselor for the grieving for a love one and many unresolved answers at the time. So, I decided to reach out to our Stephen Ministry at FPC. I needed a care receiver! Something, that is not always easy for me or others to ask for help in our everyday life. I learned this was not a weakness about myself. I needed support! At the time, I did not realize that a Stephen Minister receives over 50 hours of training for caring for a care receiver.

As a member of FPC, I had been a backseat supporter of Stephen Ministry. Some years ago, prior to First Presbyterian Church's introducing the Stephen Ministry as a vital part for congregational service. I learned at my Cousin's memorial service in Waco, Texas that he and his widow were Stephen Ministers at a Lutheran Church.

During the time, I had a brief conversation with my late cousin's friend and fellow Stephen Minister. He explained to me that Stephen Ministry is a Christian Ministry and non-denominational. A person suffering from grief can be in need of a care receiver for numerous reasons such as a death of family member/friend, loss of a job, health concerns, divorce, broken relationship and any other life changes one faces.

So what was my experience as a care receiver from fall of 2012 through the end of 2013? The comfort of being assigned a Stephen Minister of the same gender. This made good trust immediately. My conversations with my Stephen Minister during our weekly visits were confidential. As well as my name would never be mentioned at the Stephen Ministry meetings/training. The comfort of being able to express my concerns, grief and troubles with a caring/well trained Christian layperson. These words of my own concern helped me understand my inner thoughts and at times releasing my grief with a good cry. The days and weeks prior to my loss of my family member made me more aware that God was with me as he always is at any moment. The storm of sadness that I traveled from trips to hospitals visiting my love one and discussions with other family members were not easy. But, I knew that my own life was not unique. Other friends had or will face the death of a love one or other forms of grief as mentioned. The unselfish commitment and time of a Stephen Minister is sometimes unbelievable.

Circumstances of any type of grief change anyone. I know that I will always have tender moments of good memories with my family member. Grief is real and troublesome for anyone. But the body of others' arms, legs ears, and mouth is supported through Jesus' love and concern for you or I. This is a true blessing and relief!

Children's Center

Dr. Louis Zbinden had a vision in the late 1970s of meeting the need for quality infant and childcare in the downtown area. Together with Carolyn Harte, this idea came to fruition with the opening of the First Presbyterian Church Children's Center in 1980. Since its establishment the Center has served as an outreach ministry of the church to serve the children of families whose parents work in the downtown community and has made Jesus visible in the lives of thousands of children and their families.

The Children's Center is the full-time, year-round, early childhood center accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). The Center is funded through a combination of student tuition and a special benevolence of the church's operating budget.

We are blessed with many gifted teachers who have been with the Center for several years. As an NAEYC accredited center, many Lead teachers hold bachelor's degrees and nurture growing young minds into responsible, Christian, educated children. However, the continuation of their professional development training relies solely upon fundraising.

The first annual Spring Fling will be held in Saturday, April 12, to benefit the Children's Center. The purpose of the dinner is to create funds necessary to send the teaching staff to the annual NAEYC conference for professional development, provide scholarships for families and purchase needed equipment.



Have you ever left the worship service with a desire to have someone to talk to or pray with you regarding some spiritual need? In the Baptist churches that I attended during my early years, we had an "alter call" at the close of the service for anyone who wished to talk or pray with the pastor. Although as Presbyterians we do not have this tradition, at First Presbyterian Church we provide an opportunity for anyone to talk to or pray with a member of the Deaconate in the Griffith Chapel and in Westminster Hall following the worship service.

We pray together because Jesus added his special promises to shared prayers: "Again I say to you, if two of you agree on earth about anything they ask, it will be done for them by my father in Heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of them." (Matthew 18:19-20)

During my years as a deacon, it has been my privilege to pray with our members as well as visitors. Some have expressed concerns for health issues; some for difficult family relationships; some regarding future life decisions; and others dealing with their relationship with Christ. What a blessing it is to be able to share promises of love and forgiveness: "If we confess our sins He is faithful and just to forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9)

Through this ministry we offer the opportunity for you, in confidence, to share your concerns; pray alone in

silence; or have the deacon pray with you regarding your specific needs.

If you wish to have an appointment with one of our pastors, we are available to assist in making this contact possible through the church office.

As distinctively caring Christians, both we and the person with whom we pray will find strength and assurance, knowing that their concerns are left in the hands of an all-knowing and loving God.

The History Corner

Scripture in Fabric Art The Parable of the Sower; Matthew 13

"A farmer went out to sow his seed. As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path and the birds came and ate it up. Some fell on rocky places where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly because the soil was shallow. But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched and they withered because they had no root. Other seed fell among thorns which grew up and choked the plants. Still other seed fell on good soil where it produced a crop—a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. He, who has ears, let him hear.

"Listen then to what the parable of the sower means: When anyone hears the message about the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what was sown in his heart. This is the seed sown along the path. The one who received the seed that fell on rocky places is the man who hears the word and at once receives it with joy. But since he has no root, he lasts only a short time. When trouble or persecution comes because of the word, he quickly falls away. The one who received the seed that fell among the thorns is the man who hears the word, but the worries of this life and the deceitfulness of wealth choke it, making it unfruitful. But the one who received the seed that fell on good soil is the man who hears the word and understands it. He produces a crop, yielding a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown."

A beautiful fabric art screen depicting this parable hangs in Covenant Hall. The artwork, created by Joan Sumners in 1988, was donated to First Pres by the family of Frederick Llewellyn Thomson, Jr. in his honor.

Frederick Llewellyn, Jr. was born October 21, 1915 in Harden County in East Texas. He was about six years old when he moved to San Antonio with his parents, Dr. Frederick Thomson and wife Eddie and sister, Dorothy.

Frederick, Jr. became Vice President of Whites Mine, Inc., an asphalt mining operation located in Uvalde County. He and his wife, Evelyn "Prissy" raised five children: Frederick III, Trisha, Ethel, Elizabeth and Edmond. Frederick died December 1, 1969 at age 54.

You may remember that the October newsletter featured the "Not My Will but Thine be Done" stained glass window. That window was donated by Frederick Jr.'s father, Dr. Frederick Llewellyn Thomson in honor of his parents. At least two known descendents of Frederick Llewellyn Thomson, Jr. and his wife Prissy continue as members of First Pres; their daughters, Tricia Chilcutt and Ethel Runion.
