Pastor's Pondering

A Place Where Things Happen

"He is Risen, He is Risen Indeed!"

I'm sorry; did I just say that out loud? I can't believe I just did that—Easter Sunday was last month. I must have inadvertently used a newsletter article from last month. How could I have been so irresponsible? Here I am shouting out the Good News a month late (or a year early, depending on your perspective). Please forgive me—just act like you didn't read that first line.

Of course, I am being a tad bit facetious. But sometimes I wonder if the church realizes that it is perfectly acceptable to shout out the Good News of our Risen Lord even on days other than Easter Sunday.

I recently was reminded of an interesting newsletter article a pastor friend of mine wrote. I want to share with you a portion of it:

"Recently I was reading an article titled "Sizing Up the Shape of the Church." It spoke of challenges facing the mainline churches, of which Presbyterians are a part. I was struck by the following:

'[W]e Protestants have inherited a particular view of the church—the right preaching of the gospel, the right administration of the sacraments, and the exercise of church discipline—have bequeathed to us an understanding that the church is a place where certain things happen.' However, in this century this view has been changing. The fruits of the missionary movement and the emergence of a global church have led us to see that the church is essentially a body of people sent on a mission.' (Jim Wallace, The Westwind)"

There's a lot to that. But what really caught my attention was the challenge to consider our view of the church. We speak of church as, "I'm going to church." We ask, "Where is your church?" Is the church nothing more than a building



or buildings that we pull up to, walk in, get what we want, and then drive off to the next "getting" place?


Friends, I pray First Presbyterian Church of San Antonio will forever be a "place where certain things happen." And I pray we will claim the truth that being church is being a body of people sent on a mission. Jesus did not take His journey to the cross in order that we could "go" to church. Jesus took His journey in order that we might "be" the church.

We are Easter people—what we celebrated on Easter must be lived out every day of our lives. The empty tomb promises that your heart will forever be full. As Christians we are to walk with the Risen Lord and we are to invite others to walk with us. However, as one author so aptly put it, "If evangelism means those who know Christ introducing him to those who don't, then those who are seeking to make him known must themselves reflect an intimate relationship with the Lord. Otherwise the introductions are likely to prove abortive. We cannot convincingly introduce people to someone we knew a long time ago or to someone we simply read about (Eddie Gibbs)."

As we begin to get excited about our summer plans—may we also remain excited about the plans the Lord has for FPC. We have a mission to be and make disciples as we live to make Jesus visible to the world around us. Let's not wait until next year to do so—do it today.

Simple, wise, and powerful words. We each face unique life circumstances. Yet, as we have discovered in our recent sermon series at FPC, we all share a common call to respond in some way to the healing and the hope we have through Jesus Christ.

How does our FPC Mission Team to Mexico help people suffering with pain to experience hope, healing, and joy?



HOPE AND HEALING IN MEXICO





This spring, our congregation commissioned a large group of eager servants to the southern-most area of Mexico to partner with the organization Yucatan Peninsula Mission (YPM) in bringing encouragement, medical assistance, and comfort to the descendants of the Mayas.

For this marginalized people group with limited access to medical care, minor illnesses easily develop into chronic, painful, or debilitating conditions. However, God is working through the people of our church, planting within this team a passion for service and a desire for "living to make Jesus visible" worldwide.







Motivated by faith to seek out the hurt and the forgotten (Matthew 25:40), and to comfort others with the comfort we have received (2 Corinthians 1-4), the team seeks to make disciples of all nations (Matthew 28:19) and most importantly, to bring glory to our Father in Heaven (Matthew 5:16).















This sweet mother and her daughter share a condition known as cleft lip and palate. Over 3,200 babies per year in Mexico are born with this condition, which occurs when the two plates of the skull that form the roof of the mouth are not completely joined. The team was able to meet with this family, hear their concerns, and assist in seeking partnership with a non-governmental organization called "Smile Train" to provide follow-up patient care. Smile Train is an international organization, offering services in Mexico since 2001. More than 70 specialized surgeons in Mexico work in coordination through 38 partner hospitals to provide the important resource of high-quality medical care and speech therapy from across the country. Praise God for the opportunity He provided to work through the team members in this way. Please join with the team in praying that the follow-up care for this family would bring the physical healing this young mom desires for herself and for her daughter.

NOTES FROM OUR TRIP LEADER

"March 20-25, 2014 was an amazing five days! FPC San Antonio sent a team of 17 people to the Yucatan for the 30th annual Medical Mission Trip, to make Jesus visible to the indigenous Maya people there. We were joined by a team of 6 from FPC (Birmingham, MI), a team of 2 nurses from Northminster Presbyterian Church (Peoria, IL), plus two Mexican dentists and two Mexican medical students. Physicians, nurses, dentists, pharmacists, translators, an optician, and various helpers came together as a team and brought medical care, medicines, comfort, hugs and smiles to the people in the two villages of San Cosme and Leona Vicario.

The mission spirit was so readily visible in this team. It was an incredible blessing to watch as 25 people from different churches and different regions of the U.S. came together and blended seamlessly into a very effective team. Each person found his or her niche quickly, traded jobs with someone else as needed, learned the Mexican version of "Duck, Duck, Goose", organized arts and crafts with the children, agreed to sleep in a hammock (lessons on getting in and out were given), washed dishes after our meals, celebrated two upcoming marriages and a baby who is on the way, and just generally were the faces of the love and grace of Jesus Christ to those whom we went to serve and to each other.

This year was different in a couple of ways. First, we were there over a weekend, so we were able to attend church on Sunday and worship, sing and pray with that congregation. We also visited a respite house for children with cancer, bringing toys and words of encouragement to the children there. Another difference was that we served in two different clinics this year. On Friday, thanks to the hard work and planning of Craig Bell and his pharmacy team, we moved the entire pharmacy to San Cosme, to the Pan-American Clinic there. The people of San Cosme and four surrounding villages would not have been able travel to Leona Vicario to receive the care and medicines the team brought, so we went to them. And according to the figures we were given, about 120 people were seen that day and many, many prescriptions and eyeglasses were given out. At the end of the day we moved everything back to Leona Vicario, and Saturday and Monday we worked at the government Health Center Clinic there, where some 300+ patients received care, medicines and eyeglasses in those two days. All in all it was an extremely successful mission trip, and a tremendous blessing to all who participated.

We are so very grateful to Pastor William and Erly Cen, who are the loving and gracious faces of YPM Mexico, and who made everything ready for us and made us so welcome. And we are especially grateful to the congregation of First Presbyterian Church for your loving support—for the medicines and money you donated, and most of all for the prayers that lifted us up and gave us the energy and joy to go and make Jesus visible. "..! enjoy the fellowship as we work together. There always seems to be an immediate bonding because we are there for the same purpose – to serve others in any and every way we can. I love being able to talk to the local people who come for help, to learn a little about their lives and to help determine if and how we can help them. It is in these conversations that I can briefly and naturally speak about why we come and of our faith. A mission trip always makes me aware of how amazingly blessed I am, especially of things that I just take for granted or feel entitled to – it helps give me a 'perspective adjustment' of my everyday busyness, to-do lists, even the various volunteer things I do. "If you have ever wanted to go on a medical mission trip, consider praying about going on this one. I'm a pediatric emergency nurse and this was my first year to go with FPC on the Yucatan Peninsula Mission. I immediately felt welcomed and fully part of the team. FPC has been involved in this medical for over 30 years and the organization and detail is evident. From flights and accommodations to email communication and supplies, this trip was well-planned and purposefully executed. Because of this, we were able to bring much needed care to the people of Leona Vicario and the surrounding region in the name of Jesus." (Leslie Stephens)

In the United States, we celebrate mothers during the month of May. We asked a few of our FPC missionary moms living in different areas of the world to share with our congregation their thoughts about motherhood. Let's support each of their ministries within their family and within their communities by offering our prayers during the month of May for our international sisters in Christ!



I'm a mom and I'm raising my children... in Cambodia. I once felt this self-imposed pressure to be doing something "radical." But my days look much like they would in America. I feed my children, change their diapers and try to keep my house clean. My husband's job is changing children's lives here, but what am I doing? Yes I think it is very important for me to raise our young children, but I could do that in America. What am I doing to show Christ's love to Cambodia?

I read something from an Anglican Bishop in New Zealand, Bishop Justin Duckworth "The church would, he says, be revolutionized if every parishioner had two shared meals every week, one to support a church member and one to spend time with someone on the edge."

My time is very limited, but I know I can make room for two people. So twice a week I and my daughters spend time with my two friends, to encourage one in her faith, and show Christ's love to the other. There's nothing radical about our conversations, we often talk about our family, but it's something. And then before I fall asleep, I pray for them.

My day to day job isn't working at a church or a ministry, but that doesn't mean I can't do something to help further God's kingdom, even if it's just a small thing.

"For if the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what he does not have." (2 Corinthians 8:12)

Sarah Blaine (in Cambodia)

What is the typical role of a mother within the people group you interact with most closely?

"Most Spanish mothers in the current generation work full-time from the time their babies are 3 months old. (the children are in daycare or stay with grandparents until they are 3 years old, when they go to preschool). This is very different from past generations when women stayed at home with the children and played the role of a traditional housewife."

Describe a "day in the life" for you as a missionary mom.

"Every day is different: Monday I go with Ashraf and the kids to our base for worship and odd jobs. Tuesday, the 4 year old goes to preschool and I spend the morning outside with the toddler, or doing errands, cleaning, or cooking. Wednesday is our "fun/educational" day so I take both children to the aquarium, the library, a fun playground, etc. Thursday and Friday are similar to Tuesday. About 2 afternoons or evenings per week, we have visi-

tors at the house for a meal. Sometimes we go visit others in their homes or meet at a playground."

What is it like to observe your kids grow up in a culture that may be different than your own? How has that impacted you as a mom?

"Spain (Europe generally) is far more liberal than the USA or at least the USA I grew up in. :) It has been very challenging to decide how to react when our 3 year old has been exposed to sexual behavior at preschool (thankfully, not directly!) and how to coach him in that."


What is it like to observe your kids grow up in a culture that may be different than your own? How has that impacted you as a mom?

"Our two girls were in 2nd and 3rd grade when we went to the Philippines in 1994. They both now are in graduate school in the U.S. I think the most important thing about their growing up in a different culture is that they do not take American culture and values for granted. While they were growing up we often discussed Filipino lifestyle and values. Of course the initial focus would be on how these differed from those in the U.S., but then we were able to discuss how these compare with or are similar to biblical values and the lifestyle and attitudes that Christ calls us to have.



Now that America is their home and our girls are in the midtwenties, it's encouraging to see them apply those same analytical skills to assessing American culture. For both our daughters that has affected how they view current issues, vote, with whom they make friends and their career choices. Now my kids challenge me about values and priorities I have always assumed and just accepted. This makes me a better Christian. They and I also recognize that America has much to offer the world, but also much to learn from the world."

What's on <u>your</u> heart? Has the Lord called you to have a passion for something that is much bigger than you can address alone?

Share your concern with the Prayer Ministry Committee. The Committee facilitates for members of the congregation their call to invoke prayer for what the Holy Spirit has put onto their hearts. We know from scripture that praying brings us joy and blessings: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus." (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18)

At First Pres we have a myriad of regular opportunities to grow in daily prayer and to join with others in prayer. We pray in groups at Sunday School, Bible Studies, Life Groups, and Presbyterian Women Circle groups. We pray two-by-two or in groups in After Worship Prayer, and individually or as part of a group through the listings on the Prayer and Concern Line (210-222-2273).

We also have specialized and as-needed team efforts. Church officers and other members meet with and pray for our pastors before worship services. Other members on teams pray for the ongoing work of pastors, committees, the Session and Diaconate, and the larger church. There are informal e-mail groups praying for truth, purity and grace in the church. Other organized and publicized teams pray for a local or international ministry, or area of crisis or ongoing need. First Pres also offers special activities like Sunday services for healing and wholeness, and sometimes a season of prayer by or for the entire church.

The Prayer Ministry Committee is ready to assist you or a group of members with finding the best ways to ensure that our congregation is active in prayer for what God is calling us to in every season. Remain open to the possibility of praying more, whether privately or by inviting others into prayer with you, and to receiving and praying as well for what's on the hearts of other members.

If praying alone, these simple guidelines have proven helpful. Pray as the Holy Spirit is leading you! Pray, simply stating the issue! And thank God the Father, Jesus the Son and the Holy Spirit for their love, care and power in the issue.

New Officers a Diverse Group, United in Making Jesus Visible



Welcoming Well

The month of May at almost every college means the end of spring semester and a transition back home for three months. By Memorial Day weekend our Sunday services at First Pres will have many new faces. Faces that have grown up in our church, but have just experienced a year at college where life is just a bit different.

A tremendous amount of growth happens during a single year at college, for most students. Especially for students who live far from home college tends to place a sense of independence and maturity on students. By the time May rolls around countless memories have been made and numerous papers have been written. It is never really easy for a college student to transition from a world of constant academia and socializing to a home life that may look quite different. Even a transition from cafeteria food to home cooking is quite a culture shock (not a bad one I might add)



So as a church body, as faith parents and as the family of God, how do we proceed to welcome these students back?

To answer that question I have compiled a list of five things that will help us as a church to build better relationships with our college-aged members. This list is neither exhaustive or authoritative, but rather this is meant to be a starting point towards making our church a welcoming and loving force for people of all ages.


- 1. Assume they have experienced more in the past year than writing papers and sleepless nights. College is a jampacked with lectures, tests, sub-par food and independence. Even one semester away at college is filled to the brim with navigating relationships, making minor and major personal decisions, exploration of faith and many other life-shaping experiences. Looking back on college may bring up fond memories filled with fun and maybe even irresponsibility, but college is a true test of maturity. We have to assume that these students have experienced more in a year than they can easily sum up with short phrases such as "it's been good".
- 2. Make sure they know they were missed. If we want to welcome our students back with open arms and help them integrate back into our church we must show them that they are desired and were missed as a member of our church. Along with this expression of missing a student we must take it a step further and express our excitement that we have them and all of their gifts/talents back home. There is no part of the body of Christ that is more important than another and our college-aged students are integral parts of our family at First Pres.
- 3. Take them out for lunch. College students learn a lot of things, but one of the most valuable life lessons they are taught is to excitedly accept free food. Something simple like taking a student out for a meal does so much to tell that person that they were missed and are desired. Food is a great way to sit down and have a conversation with

someone who will be soon headed into the workforce and "real world." These students will be drastically affecting our country's culture the moment they step off of the stage with their new degree, they deserve the time and wisdom of the body of Christ.

4. Pray with and for them. One of the most valuable things for a college-aged student is for them to know that they are not only being prayed for, but also being prayed with. College is a time of great discernment. What relationships to pursue, what major, what career choice and so on. These students need to be walked next to on their journey, they need the encouragement of knowing that their struggles and decisions are important, which they are. Begin to pray with our students and not just for them.

5. Discover who they are apart from their parents. Some students feel a lot more like themselves while they are at school and are even stressed about who to be and how to act while they are home. As the body of Christ it is our responsibility to discover who our students are in Christ, not who they are as a son or daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Smith. Our culture is in a constant battle over identity and we need to be able to see our young men and women as the unique son and daughter of God that they are. No one feels as welcomed as they do when others see them for their true selves. It may be a hard habit to break, especially when you have seen this student grow up from a toddler, but they have been on their own at school for months. There is surely more to who they are than their last name. Allow them to be the man or woman of God that they are becoming daily.

KEYS Enjoy a Royal Trip

How does one enjoy royal treatment while traveling in South Texas? Well, one way is by taking a bus trip to Kings-



ville, then busing around the ranch roads of the legendary King Ranch at the edge of town. An intergenerational group of fifty-one members of FPC and their guests did just that in the first week in April sponsored by KEYS (Keeping Everyone Young in Spirit) Adults.

The tour guide on the ranch was a delightful 84-year-old fellow Beto Maldonedo, a third-generation kineno who has worked on the ranch since he was 10 years old. The kenenos were the ranch hands Richard King brought to the ranch from Mexico in 1853 to begin working the land which



eventually became an 825,000 acre spread, one the largest ranches in the world. The King Ranch developed the Santa Gertrudis cattle, the first official cattle breed in the Ameri-

cas and sports one of the most-impressive wildlife management programs in the nation.

Maldonado told the travelers fascinating stories of how the King and Kleberg families have developed and nurtured the ranch over these 161 years.

On the bus trip around the ranch grounds, KEYS members visited the weaving building, where workers once wove saddle blankets and other ranch items and viewed the exterior of the 17-bedroom main ranch house. Visitors no longer tour the house itself, which just might remind movies fans of the dwelling from Edna Ferber's Giant. Which many claim is based on the King Ranch legend.



Louis became the first to hold the chair the following year.

Louis was also directly responsible for the San Antonio Metropolitan Ministries (SAMM) and the Christian Assistance Ministry (CAM), for two outreach ministries that serve the homeless.

"I am so grateful for the words of Pastor Zbinden as he has had a tremendous impact on my journey in faith over the



years," notes Susan. "It is so fitting and I am so humbled to have his foreword as an introduction to my work."
