ver the last few months, I have noticed that I am having more trouble seeing things clearly—both at a distance and up close. I need glasses to drive and other glasses to read texts and see pictures on my smart phone. So, my New Year's resolution is to get my eyes checked and get new glasses so that I will have 20/20 vision in the year 2020.

As we enter the new decade of 2020, God is calling us to a new level of clarity in our church's vision. As we pursue our call to love Jesus Christ. love one another, and love the city, I believe that God is calling us to focus our attention and energy on loving and building healthy families. That's why, in 2020, FPC is joining a movement called Decade of the Family.

Decade of the Family İS collaborative partnership initiated by UnicitySA<sup>[1]</sup> and designed to bring government, education, healthcare (including mental health), nonprofits, businesses, churches/faith communities. foundations and individuals together for the sake of strengthening families. The mission of Decade of the Family is to help every family thrive in a productive, positive manner by serving as a resource for connection, communication, restoration, and hope. The Goal of DOF is to make San Antonio "The Best City to Raise a Family" by 2030. (Learn more at decadeoffamily.org)

The family is the system that God has provided for the growth and health of his people. It is woven into the fabric of creation. One of God's earliest statements about humanity is that "it is not good that man should be alone." God used the family of Noah to reset humanity after it fell into corruption and he used the family of Abraham to begin his process of restoration. In Genesis 1:3, God declared.

<sup>3</sup> I will bless those who bless you, and him who dishonors you I will curse, and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed."

Finally, the son of God was born into a human family where he was nurtured, protected, encouraged and challenged.

The family should be the environment in which people learn the good news of Jesus Christ and experience the grace of God. This system, however, is in crisis. The data shows that rates of incarceration, addiction, human trafficking, educational imbalance, food insecurity, suicide, joblessness, mental illness and so many of our other problems begin with the breakdown of the family. We believe that by working together to fortify the family "upstream," we will provide a healthier city "downstream."

The Decade of the Family is not just a city vision. It is a vision for the FPC family as well. To be healthy

(20/20), our vision must see the "up-close" needs of families in our congregation as well as the needs of families in our city. "For the promise is for you and for your children [up-close] and for all who are far off [distance], everyone whom the Lord our God calls to himself."

We will begin 2020 by welcoming our new Director of Youth Ministries to our Family Ministry Team. Alex Clary is coming to us from Trenholm Road United Methodist Church in Columbia, South Carolina. 



# **Proyecto Amistad**

Spreading Hope at the Border

his past November three members of FPC took the short, 2 ½-hour drive south to the city of Nuevo Laredo in the Mexican state of Tamaulipas. Here, the group met with Roberto Medina, a Presbyterian pastor at Puerta Del Cielo in Nuevo Laredo. Roberto is also the director of Proyecto Amistad, a program FPC supports through its global missions ministry.

In the past months, Nuevo Laredo and the entire US/Mexico border have been in the news with the faces of migrants at the forefront of these stories. Many of these people come from Central America, but others come from South America and even as far as Cameroon. The reasons people have for making these long journeys vary, with some based on false propaganda distributed by their home country's government. Regardless of the reason, once these travelers reach the

US/Mexico border, they generally are granted a hearing with a U.S. immigration judge. This hearing, though, can be months from their initial arrival date to the border. During this waiting period, the travelers have little to no resources, are often seen sleeping on the streets, and are at the mercy of their environment, which includes cartel violence.



Roberto and his church have sought to help these travelers. One way is by passing out gift bags containing soap, toothpaste, snacks, and Bible verses to those congregating at the Mexican immigration office near the international bridge. For many, this small gesture means a lot as they have not been able to shower or brush their teeth in days or weeks. This gesture also provides justification for Roberto to communicate with and love on these people face-to-face while they are staying in and around the immigration office. Another way Roberto is helping is by providing some travelers a safe place to stay. Using a gift from FPC, Roberto's church was able to renovate a building on their property, which now has a living area, kitchen, bathroom, and bedroom, as well as an improved fence for security.

During FPC's November visit, the team met a young woman and her toddler son who had journeyed from Honduras and were currently staying in the building. Roberto first met the woman at the immigration office when he saw that her son was very sick. Roberto was able to take the boy to a doctor and he is now well, smiling and playing with his mother. The young woman and her son will be staying in the building until their immigration hearing in February.

Roberto's other focus, Proyecto Amistad, concentrates on a program called Club Amistad, which reaches out to children by teaching them the gospel and the love of Jesus Christ. During the visit, the team was able to see a small neighborhood church where a Club Amistad gathering was going on. The team was able to spend time with the fifteen children and watch them create bookmarks with "Psalm 119:103" written on them which reads, "How sweet are your words to my taste, sweeter than honey to my mouth!"

### How to Get Involved

In the coming months, FPC hopes to send a mission team to Nuevo Laredo. There are many tasks that can be done, such as renovating buildings used by the neighborhood churches and Club Amistad groups. In the meantime, we can be praying. Having someone such as Roberto on the front lines to help the travelers at the US/Mexico border is truly the work of the Holy Spirit. Please pray for Roberto, his wife Kassumy, his church Puerta Del Cielo, the children who are part of Club Amistad, and all the travelers who are currently homeless on the US/Mexico border.





019 has been a wonderful year at FPC, as we have been able to serve our homeless and under-resourced neighbors in a variety of ways. Our neighbors are invited in to the Student Center on the third Saturday of each month for a hot meal, showers, haircuts, worship and fellowship around tables. Churches and school groups around the city have joined with FPC to serve, and relationships are being built between volunteers and guests. In the last 12 months at Loaves and Fishes, there have been an average of 114 guests, with as many as 200 in May and June! There are about 60 volunteers each month, half of which come from FPC. Our partnership with the Faith Based Institute has provided us with invaluable help as we learn how to build relationships with our guests

through times of prayer and preparation, and leading worship and sharing testimony. God continues to provide the people and resources needed each month as we faithfully serve our community.

Our neighbors are also invited into FPC each week at Monday Night Community Bible Study, for a meal and to dive deeper into Scripture and relationship. Each week, about 40 of our neighbors join volunteers from FPC and the Faith Based Institute to learn more about the hope and transformation that is provided, only through the redemptive work of Jesus Christ. They share their lives and stories, and the community is able to celebrate how the Lord is working and moving to bring light into places of darkness, and direction to those





who are lost. What a blessing to be able to serve these men and women, as we see our own hearts transform as we all grow together in community!

Another incredible story of collaboration and God's faithful provision is seen in the Kingdom Restoration Lab. Since the KRL's doors opened in 2019, nearly 500 of our neighbors have been served through over 1,600 appointments with our collaborative ministry partners, SA Hope Center (formerly the San Antonio Christian Hope Resource Center), CAM, Any Woman Can, and the Faith Based Institute. The volunteers from FPC have embraced our neighbors as they enter the KRL each day.

We enjoy celebrating stories of transformation and hope with our neighbors through these incredible ministries at FPC. God's love is evident in the good work that is being done through Loaves and Fishes, Community Bible Study, and the KRL, and we wait with anticipation for the many ways the Lord will use FPC to love 2.1.0.!

# The Most Wonderful Time of the Year




