Casablanca, COVID-19, and **Easter Sunday**

asablanca is a movie classic. When we watch the movie in the year 2020, we watch it as a period piece—a story about wartime romance and courage set against the backdrop of World War II. As we watch Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman, we cannot escape the knowledge that the war is over—that the Nazis were defeated, and the world was saved from an unspeakable horror.

But the original audience had a different perspective. The people who saw the movie in 1942 did not know what we know. To both the characters of the movie, and the original audience, Casablanca was not about history—it was about current events. In 1942, while the movie was in production. North Africa was still under control of the Nazis and their allies. The memory of Pearl Harbor was less than a

year old and the battle was raging in the pacific. India, China and most of the eastern Pacific were under Japanese control. D-Day had not taken place. The streets of Stalingrad were running red with the blood of two million people as the Russian Red Army tried to hold against Hitler's Panzer divisions. The horrors of Auschwitz and Dachau were yet unknown to the rest of the world.

When Casablanca came out, the world was very violent, dark and scary. The outcome of the war was not at all certain. One of the themes of the movie was the dilemma of Humphrey Bogart's character, Rick: whether one surrenders and plays it safe in the face of evil (like Louis) or fights on and helps the resistance in the hope that freedom, justice, and goodness will prevail (like Lazlo).

To us *Casablanca* is not a scarv movie because we know how the war ended. We can see the big picture. We know the whole story. But the original audience did not.

The original disciples faced a similar dilemma. On Good Friday they saw their teacher, mentor and friend falsely accused as both a heretic and a criminal, cruelly tortured and brutally executed. Even though the Lord had warned them that he would be arrested, accused, tortured and killed, they were not ready. Their hearts could not stand the truth their eyes beheld.

To them it looked like the end:

the end of their work together... the end of Jesus' new vision for a kingdom of love... the end of hope that things might get better. On that Friday, everything changed. Friday evening and Saturday they were filled with fear that the temple authorities or the Romans might come for them next. They hid wondering if it would ever be safe to go out again. Would it ever

It had to be the longest Saturday in history because they did not know what we know.

They did not know what we know 2000 years later. They did not know that the cross was not the end of the story. They did not understand that on that Easter Sunday God would raise Jesus Christ from the dead, body and soul in glorious victory over death and all the evil and sin that had been mustered against him.

Like the characters and audiences of *Casablanca*, the disciples thought that fear and death had won. On that Holy Saturday they were in a "new normal." They did not know that they were only in the middle of the story.

Then Easter happened. God showed them, and us, that our God is the God who keeps His promises. The Angel at the empty tomb said,

... "Do not be afraid, for I know that you seek Jesus who was crucified. He is not here, for he has risen, as he said. Come, see the place

where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples that he has risen from the dead..." (Mt:28:5-7)

Jesus warned them about his death, but he also promised them that after three days, he would rise again. On Easter Sunday, God kept that promise.

In some ways we are like the disciples—living in Holy Saturday stuck between Good Friday and Easter Sunday. We don't know when the COVID-19 crisis will end, nevertheless, we will celebrate Easter and remind ourselves that it will end. We will declare to the world that fear and uncertainty are not the new normal. We will celebrate Easter to proclaim that death and sickness are broken powers and that Jesus Christ has broken the permanence of disease and death. We will celebrate Easter to declare that He has won the war.

Because the resurrection really happened, we believe that God is real, that He loves us, that He hears our prayers, that He keeps his promises, and that He has the power to save us from any pestilence that assails us. And days, weeks or months from now, when we emerge from the tomb of quarantine and crisis, we will all get together to declare "He is risen!"

AN IRRESISTIBLE CHRISTIAN RESPONSE TO THE

CORONAVIRUS CRISIS

esus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever (Hebrews 13:8). This truth is in contrast to the everchanging headlines of our culture that are leading to heartache for many losing a handle on hope. Christians must abide in the unchanging person and truths of God and His word, to live with hope from our heart and in our homes as we share hope with our world. People are looking for stability and security and Christians will be irresistible in their faith when we live securely under the headlines of Heaven.

The Church has largely accepted two realities of the current crisis. First, we must love our neighbors through seeking to flatten the curve by practicing social distancing. Second, we are definitely heading into a new normal and none of us know what to expect. For an irresistible faith in and through this storm the Church must accept a larger reality, namely that our God Reigns and He is sovereign over every detail. The wind and the waves still obey His voice.

We must first acknowledge the remaining uncertainty: How severe will the crisis become? Will our healthcare system be sustainable? How severe will the downstream implications be for families, the economy, and our society? Acknowledging the uncertain nature of our times strengthens the transformation coming from believing in God's unchanging nature that must rule the hour.

Grace and promise in crisis and calamity. <u>Read Isaiah</u> <u>52:1-10</u>

Isaiah's original audience was a people in exile with potential to panic, uncertain of their future, and devastated by a rapid change of the landscape of life. In this oddly identifiable historical context we see the shaping power of the headlines of Heaven which publish peace-Our God reigns. The reality of this revelation is a theme of Scripture and Isaiah 52:1-10 shows us why it should be the theme of our song.

Grace awakens God's people. Like the prodigal son who came to his senses and returned to the Father (Luke 15), God's people are to "shake off the dust and arise," to awaken (52:1-2). The presence of the Lord empowers God's people. The Lord shows up in the midst of uncertainty, fulfilling His covenant promise with His presence, saying "Here I am." (52:3-6) God is not practicing social distancing. God is with us and His grace and presence empowers us to sing of his already accomplished but not yet fully applied salvation.

Isaiah 52:7-10 are lyrics to a song and God's people are commanded to sing in current circumstances (vs 8-10). There is broad participation in the song of salvation: messengers (7), watchmen (the prophets, 8), the city (9), and the ends of the earth (10). Paul picks up on the power of this passage in Romans 10:14-17, a portion of Scripture the Church uses to encourage God's people toward faithful participation in God's global mission. When we see this chorus sung along with Angels who sing with sinners who come home (Luke 15:10), we understand that participation in the song of salvation is cosmic in scope-will you join the choir?

Heavenly headline offering hope: "Your God Reigns!"

The substance of the song will be what carries Christians along through the current coronavirus crisis: YOUR GOD REIGNS (52:7). Believing this from our heart will come from preaching this to ourselves again and again, messengers with beautiful feet who publish peace and bring good news when the headlines of our world lead to hopelessness: YOUR GOD REIGNS. Living these lyrics with our lives will lead to contagious faith in our communities.

When the power of nations is paralyzed we must proclaim, OUR GOD REIGNS! When the supremacy of the economy is neutralized we must proclaim, OUR GOD REIGNS! When the fear of the unknown is crystalized we must proclaim, OUR GOD REIGNS! In our sickness and our sorrow, in our questions for tomorrow, we must proclaim that OUR GOD REIGNS! When we are parked on a powder keg of panic we must plug into the power of God's promise through proclaiming, OUR GOD REIGNS. Our creator God is on the throne, working all things according to the council of His will, for the good of those who love Him and for His own glory. OUR GOD REIGNS, and what the enemy intends for evil our God will work for good.

SHARE HOPE! Evangelism in crisis comes from believing the headline

There has been a lot of good writing on grabbing the rope of Christian heritage and running towards plagues with healing and (re)learning to love our neighbors. But what does it look like to believe the Heavenly headline from our hearts and live in hope and peace both in our homes and for those longing for hope?

Hunger for life- An elder in our congregation is in the highest category of vulnerability to COVID19. After our session meeting last week he said, "If I catch the virus I have a fourteen percent chance of dying. That also means I have an eighty-six percent chance of living- I want to live the eighty-six percent right now!" A hunger for life comes from an eternal perspective and will feed the hunger of our culture looking for life - OUR GOD REIGNS!

Stability & Security- I have a friend who works in finance and has every earthly reason to panic like his un-believing colleagues. This week I asked how I could pray for and encourage him and he said, "Please pray for my co-workers to ask me how I can remain calm when the markets are in turmoil. I want to share with them the security I have in the sovereignty of God." My friend believes the headlines of heaven and is joining the chorus of salvation- OUR GOD REIGNS! I never thought I would say this but his feet are beautiful! (see 52:7) And so are all feet sharing the good news, publishing peace through proclaiming "Our God Reigns." Feet stewarded for gospel proclamation show character and grit, communicating the urgency of a hopeful heart. Look at the feet pictured below: those feet belong to souls in Southeast Asia who are seeking to know and share the Good News.



Media on Mission- Consider another friend, a mom, who used her social media to share the lyrics of the Song of Salvation. After sharing a joyful picture of her children on Instagram she offered a short reflection on having joy in all circumstances, followed by an invitation for people to direct message her, to call to talk, and to pray. My mom-friend believes the headline of heaven- OUR GOD REIGNS! And her beautiful

feet are seen through inviting her followers to know the substance of the song- OUR GOD **REIGNS!**

Peace or Panic? Lord, help us with our unbelief!

.

Will the world witness secure hope in your heart and home? The grace of God awakens us and the person of God meets us, demonstrating the covenant faithfulness of the Lord to His promises. Our unchanging Lord Jesus rules over all that is seen and unseen (Colossians 1:15-20) so pick yourself up from the dust and despondency of the day and return to His love!

The world needs to see a people who believe the Heavenly Headline, OUR GOD REIGNS! Your neighbors may not realize it, but they long to join the choir of Christians who sing the song of salvation with our lips and our lives. The banner of the Lord's sovereignty will give peace to our homes and hope to our neighbors when we believe. SHARE HOPE! And when you find yourself face down in the dust of despondency realize the grace and person of God are inviting you to arise, awaken, and to join the chorus of God's song of salvation- OUR GOD REIGNS!

Jesus is on the throne, and He is making all things new. (Revelation 21:1-6)

FPC Team Supports Clean Water, YPM Programs in Yucatan



On February 16th, 2020, a group of nine men from First Presbyterian Church traveled to Mexico to spend a week serving with The Yucatan Peninsula Mission (YPM), in Leona Vicario, Quintana Roo, Mexico. The men on the team were Bobby Mickler, Carlos Codina, Mitchell Moore, Brian Anderson, Don Ryan, Maarten Verheul, Ron Scheibe, Chris Morse, and Noble Gilmour.

Upon arrival, the men were eager to work, share in fellowship, and work some more. On this trip they contributed to something larger than what they were able to see during their week on site: This project will result in a pure water distribution system, providing greater access to clean water for the community.

In addition to construction work on the clean water building, the team was able to participate in the new "Come and See" program through YPM. The program works to connect mission teams with the local community as they complete small projects to improve the living conditions of families. The FPC team poured a concrete floor in the home of a local family, which will allow the mother, father, and three daughters to live in a space that is much cleaner than before. The team reported that time spent working with this family was minuscule, but the gift and resulting relationships built were not.

Before departing the Yucatan, the team visited the YPM Institute where they had the privilege of being introduced to several students

and professors. As they were leaving the university, one of the professors came to the van to say something that was on her heart. As she began to cry, she expressed her gratitude for the work being done in Leona Vicario. She noted that it was a great outward expression of the gospel and that for the locals, it means hope.



While the men on this team were able to serve the people of Leona Vicario, the people served the FPC team as well. Each of them walked away from this trip with new friends, stories to tell, and success worth celebrating. That being said, it's far from over. We are looking forward to continuing to deepen our relationship with YPM, and opportunities throughout this year to go and serve.
